The Bloomfield squad swept 30 of the 34 events, winning 24 out of 28 individual contests and the six relays. Several club records were broken and Bloomfield won both first and second place in 12 of the events.

Persons who broke records were Chris Johnson, 25.2 in the 25-breaststroke; Denise Parker, 21.2 in the 25-backstroke; Mark Lennox, 31.0 in the 50-freestyle; Sandy Lundgren, 46.5 in the 50-breaststroke; Chris Johnson, 17.3 in the 25-freestyle; Nancy Nimer, 23.9 in the 25-breaststroke; Mark Lennox, 36.2 in the 50 butterfly; and Eileen Sacra, 47.0 in the 50-backstroke.

THE BOYS' 200-meter relay also broke the club record at 2:06. The double winners in the individual events were Sandy Lundgren, Howard Star, Chris Johnson, Mark Lennox and Theresa DeSimple.

The final score of the meet was 237 to 135. Coaches for Bloomfield Surf Club are Roger Lancina and Ken Goff, assistant.
