

Seek to Curb Destruction of City Mailboxes

Persons who maliciously deface or destroy mailboxes are subject to a \$1,000 fine or imprisonment for three years under federal law. And Bloomfield Hills police are determined to enforce the law in the wake of increased reports of destroyed letterboxes in the city, according to Public Safety Director Robert Stadler.

STADLER SAID that numerous mailboxes in the city had either been intentionally knocked down by cars, defaced by sticks and baseball bats, or blown apart with firecrackers.

The federal law reads: "Whoever willfully or maliciously injures, tears down or destroys a letterbox or other receptacle intended or used for receipt or delivery of mail or breaks open same or maliciously injures, defaces or destroys any mail deposited therein" is subject to the penalty.

Beverly Planners Consider Storm Water Problems

BEVERLY HILLS—Storm water problems occupied the attention of the planning board at its regular meeting Thursday evening.

A suggestion from Johnson and Anderson, village engineers, that soil borings five feet below basement level be submitted on all new plats was accepted by the board.

The borings will determine whether sump pumps should be connected to the storm sewer system. The plat for Nottingham Subdivision No. 5, submitted by Andrews and Briggs, was approved by the board with the condition that borings be submitted. The new subdivision will be between 13 and 14 Mile roads.

THE RONSDALE Subdivision plat submitted by Howard Keating is still under discussion with regard to a road through to the undeveloped area adjacent to the sub at Evergreen and Beverly roads. The board discussed with Standard Oil Co. the plans for moving pumps and building back at its location at 13 Mile Road and Southfield.
