St. Elizabeth Briarbank, a home for destitute aged, located on Woodward Ave. in Bloomfield Hills, has established a lay advisory board of directors.

According to Mother M. Malvine, dressmaker, "the operation of a home for the destitute aged has certainly changed since Briarbank first opened in 1942.

"In this modern complex society, we are faced with legal problems, medical problems and administrative problems which require many skills. Having the guidance of a lay board of experts will naturally make our operation more effective."

LEONARD R. JAGELS, a social worker, has been named president. Other officers are Nick Takis, owner of the Kingsley Inn, vice president; Philip Williams, secretary; and Mother M. Malvine, treasurer.

Members of the board include the Rev. Leo J. Trese, chaplain of St. Elizabeth Briarbank; Rev. John A. Trese, assistant secretary for Catholic charities; Walter J. Simons of Birmingham; Cass St. Jaros of Bloomfield Hills; James Reading, DDS; Charles Hannan; and Mrs. C. A. Chapman.

One of the first projects of the board will be to establish a social service program in the institution for residents and their families.
