Phillip, are back in their Clarendon Road home after a camping trip around Lake Superior from Sault to Sault.

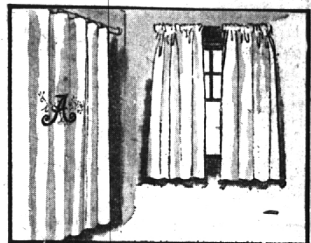
On the return trip they dropped the two older boys, David and Richard, at Camp Math-Go-Tah-See for a two week stay.

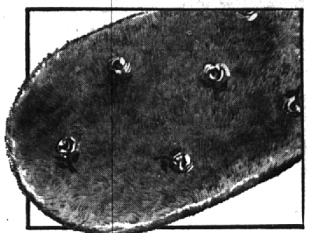
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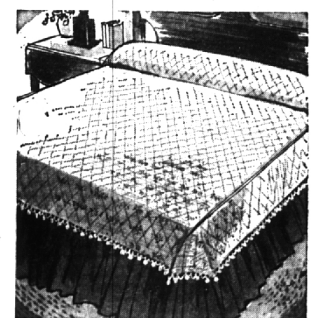
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
