The Bob Wandels had packing on their minds for their departure early Monday morning for northern Michigan, as well as daughter Gayle's swimming time.

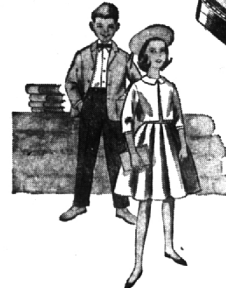

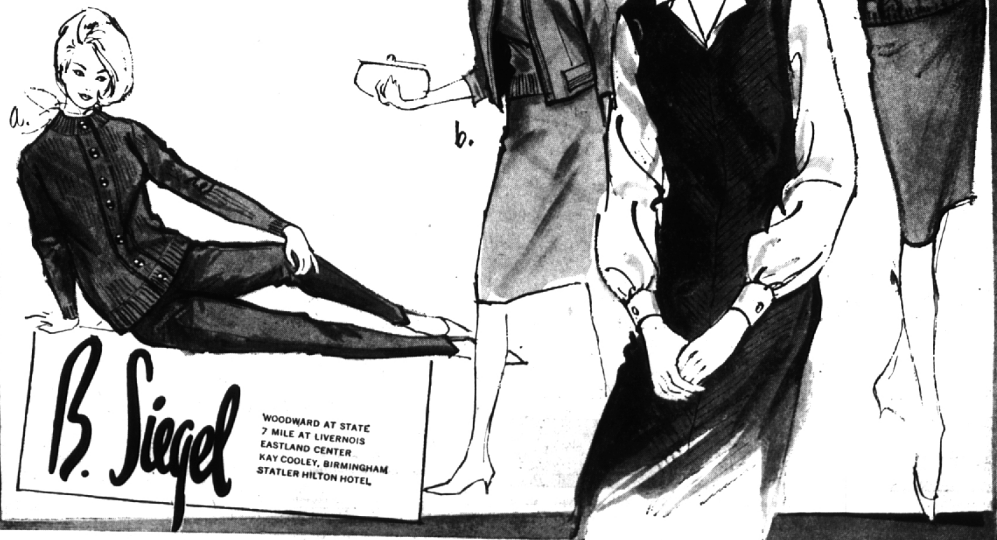
