Council to Discuss Water Availability In Beverly Hills

BEVERLY HILLS—A special council meeting has been scheduled for Monday to discuss the village water supply and the possible construction of water mains on 13 Mile and Southfield roads.

Councilman Claude A. Shephard reported that in testing the hydrants in this area, he found that only 150 gallons per minute were available, an amount insufficient to support even two small fire hoses in case of a house fire.

THE ZONING commission will study the question of whether the village should annex Acacia Park Cemetery.

Philip Hampton, who has represented the firm of Johnson and Anderson, village engineers, at 13 council meetings, was thanked by the council for his work. Hampton was promoted to sales manager this week.

IN RESPONSE to some 30 complaints about eight great dances being held on the property of Edward Harter, 1805 Lecherie, the council heard a report at Monday's meeting, given by Councilman Edward W. Shurtliff, said that while five of the dogs are puppies—five months old—and the number does not constitute a kennel, some regulations must be enforced. Harter has been ticketed four times, twice the cases were dismissed, the third is pending a hearing and the fourth was just issued.

EDWARD P. O'Rourke of the health department issued his report and said the keeping of the dogs constituted an area nuisance and a health problem because of the way the dogs are maintained. He said the dog runs are not properly cleaned and recommended that steps be taken to eliminate the health hazard.

Another ticket was issued under Ordinance 11, which states that dog runs must be cleaned daily and maintained in satisfactory condition.

Councilman Hugh G. Allerton, Jr., told the group that copies of the zoning book are exhausted, and the council authorized the spending of \$100 to reproduce the present ordinance.

VILLAGE ATTORNEY Thomas J. Dillon recommended that Councilman Edward F. Dolan's request that \$100 be donated to the Detroit Symphony Orchestra be turned down, ruling that village funds cannot be spent for this purpose.
