Grand Trunk RR Opposes I-75 Rapid Transit Lane

The Grand Trunk Western Railroad opposes setting aside a rapid transit lane for buses and trucks on the new Chrysler Expressway (I-75).

A spokesman for the GTW, Vice President and General Manager Harry A. Sanders, charges that the move would be subsidization by government of competing modes of transportation.

A proposal that traffic lanes of I-75, now under construction, be set aside for express bus service or a monorail was made by Detroit Mayor Jerome P. Cavanagh last week at the annual convention of the American Municipal Association in Houston, Tex.

THE CHRYSLER Expressway runs parallel with the Grand Trunk to a point northwest of Pontiac where the highway veers north to Flint. The railroad goes west to

Durand.

The railroad would be affected more by trucks using the special lane than by bus or monorail traffic. Two years ago Sanders said that commuter service on the Grand Trunk would probably not last beyond 1965.

Sanders said the GTW, like all American railroads, would urge that user charges be applied to any segment of the transportation industry getting preferential treatment on expressways.

CAVANAGH termed his proposal an experiment.

"We must learn soon whether a center mall exclusively for buses or a monorail should be included in future expressways."

"I've already instructed our freeway planning staff to examine the possibility of a reserved lane on the Chrysler Freeway," he said.

State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said construction of exit ramps for such mass transportation vehicles would be difficult.

"AND THE limitations of the Federal government would be another—they prohibit the use of freeways by forms of mass transportation."

Mackie indicated the problems could not be overcome for the Chrysler, but might be on future expressway projects in Detroit.

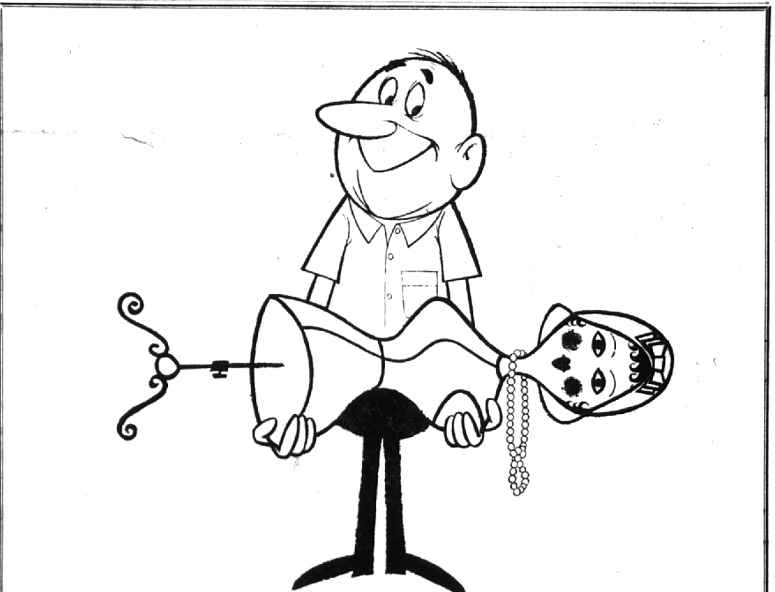
