

Peace Corps Tells Date of Next Test

A new round of Peace Corps placement tests will be administered at more than 800 post offices and college campuses beginning at 8:30 a. m., Saturday, and continuing throughout the day.

For the metropolitan Detroit area, the test will be given at 123 Federal Bldg., 231 Lafayette Blvd. The test is non-competitive. As its name implies, it enables the Peace Corps to place prospective Volunteers in an appropriate overseas situation. Everyone interested in becoming a Peace Corps Volunteer must take the test—in addition to filling out a Peace Corps Questionnaire.

The Saturday testing date will be the last general opportunity to take the Peace Corps Placement Test until Oct. 19.

THOSE SELECTED for training will spend from 10 to 12 weeks on a college campus which may include four weeks at a Peace Corps camp in Puerto Rico.

The training programs include an intensive study of the language of the host country; its history, customs and culture; American affairs; world political problems; and health problems in tropical conditions.

Volunteers agree to serve two years in the Peace Corps, including training time. The minimum age for Volunteer service is 18, with no upper age limit, and a number of persons in their seventies are among the 6,000 Volunteers now serving in 45 nations.

Married couples may serve if they have no dependents and if both husband and wife qualify for the same project.

Culver Names B'ham Boy to Top Position

James Henderson of Birmingham, has been named to one of the highest ranking positions in the brigade at the Culver Summer Schools, Culver, Ind.

With the rank of lieutenant commander, Henderson is commander of the second battalion, second highest military position among 1,650 boys attending the 1963 session of the summer schools.

LANGUAGE training is helpful for those interested in becoming Volunteers, but more than a fourth of the Peace Corps' present Volunteers never had studied a language previously.

Liberal arts graduates and others with a "general" education have performed so well in teaching and community development programs that the Peace Corps is seeking more persons with this type of background.

The Peace Corps also has requests for persons with skills in agriculture, public health, forestry, carpentry and other building skills, social work, and education of all types and at all levels.

Other nations have a skilled Peace Corps to provide Volunteers possessing more than 200 job skills. A college degree is not required.

SELECTION of Henderson was made by the military staff and counselors on the basis of leadership and military bearing.

Henderson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward L. Henderson, 535 N. Glenhurst Drive.

Six bids were opened for installation of two culverts and repairs on I-96 near the Orchard Lake Road intersection. Lower bidder was Louis Garavaglia of Warren \$165,386. Completion date is scheduled for Aug. 31, 1964.

THE HARLAN Electric Co., Southfield, was low bidder at \$183,331 among four bidders on a project for Oakland and Wayne Counties.

To be completed July 15, 1965, are five intersectional improvement projects on Telegraph Road, another at 14 Mile Road and Oakland Ave. northwest of Pontiac, and one on Grand River Ave. at Seven Mile Road, Detroit.
