

## Two Bulletins Offer Advice On Teen-agers

### Tuck in To Be Trim

Parents of teen-agers and parents of young children may be interested in two bulletins currently available from the Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service.

"In Tune with the Teens—Parent-Teen Relationships" offers guidance and understanding for dealing with teen-agers, say university officials.

"Teen-agers need and want help," author Lennah Backus, family life specialist writes, "but the way in which help is offered makes the difference."

"Live your own life," she encourages adults. "Maintain an in-

terest in and concern for your teen-ager but develop your own interests. Try not to re-live through your teen-ager those things which you may have missed in your own youth."

"DISCIPLINE FOR Young Children" discusses child behavior and the complex task of being a good parent today.

"People used to think that the

only way to raise farm crops was the way their parents did, but now they have found new and better ways based on scientific research," Mrs. Backus and co-author Ben Ard point out.

"In the same way, some people feel that the only way to rear children is the way they were reared by their parents. But recent research on children and par-

ents shows us that some older methods of discipline had harmful results.

"THIS BULLETIN should be a help to parents who want to consider better ways of handling and understanding children," they say.
