

Rubbish Pickup Change Monday

Birmingham DPW Supt. T. C. Brien has announced that there will be no rubbish pickup on Monday, Sept. 2, because of the Labor Day holiday.

He said residents who normally have trash and rubbish collected on Mondays should have the containers at curbside by 7:30 a.m. on Tuesday, Sept. 3.

Only Monday's schedule will be affected, Brien said. All other collections will be made on their regular day.

Trek to School Starts Next Week for 20,000

The more than 20,000 school-age children in the Birmingham-Bloomfield area begin the last week of their summer vacation today.

Schools door will open in both the Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills school districts Thursday, Sept. 5. In Birmingham nearly 3,900 students will be on hand, this is an increase of over 700 from last year.

Bloomfield Hills Public Schools will have an enrollment of almost 5,000 students. This is about 400 pupils more than were in the system during the 1962-63 school year.

Both school districts have scheduled half-day sessions for Thursday. The first full day of classes will be held on Friday, Sept. 6.

SCHOOL WILL open two days earlier (Tuesday, Sept. 3) for 970 girl students at Marian High School. The first week will be devoted to orientation.

At Sacred Heart Academy school will begin on Sept. 4. School officials estimate about 340 students will be enrolled in grades 1-12. Sacred Heart expects a slight increase in attendance for their school year.

The 340 boys at Detroit Country Day School will get an extra week of summer vacation. School will open with a half-day session on Wednesday, Sept. 11. Country Day teachers, however, will report work on Sept. 6.

CLASSES WON'T begin at Bloomfield Country Day until Thursday, Sept. 19, but students will report at noon Sept. 18 for the purchase of books and supplies.

Registration for Cranbrook and Kingswood schools will start on Monday, Sept. 16, and classes for the girls will begin on Tuesday and the boys the following day.

Approve Water Service for New Recreation Area

Water service will soon be extended to Birmingham's new municipal golf course and recreation area at Lincoln and Cranbrook roads.

The expenditure of \$1,900 to purchase pipe, valves and hydrants to install the service was approved by city commissioners Monday night.

Assistant City Manager Robert S. Kenning said the service will serve the activities building for the area and also provide fire protection.

He said work would begin immediately to have the service ready before the construction of the fence around the area is started.

Because the DPW did not have all the necessary materials in stock, commission approval was sought to contact suppliers personally rather than delaying the project by advertising and waiting for written bids.

Conference Competes With Money Problems

Oakland School Board is scrambling for money to finance a national social studies conference proposed by social science director Myles M. Platt.

The financial problem is a result of the estimated \$90,000 cut-back in the Oakland School budget expansion plans.

Platt hopes for an attendance of 250 social studies minds at the Nov. 8 and 9 meetings. Registration fees from participants would perhaps finance the conference.

PLATT HAS been a pioneer in revising social studies curricula for Oakland County school districts over the past year.

Platt believes research work will be improved and strengthened by the exchange of ideas between educators and national experts.

If the attendance is not as large as anticipated and fees do not finance the conference, Oakland

Supt. William J. Emerson said another fund, such as printing, would be tapped for the difference.

The board will consider the matter again at its next meeting on Sept. 5.

Two Local Men To Retire from General Motors

Two members of General Motors Corp. patent section will retire Aug. 31 under provisions of the General Motors Retirement Plan. They are Carl F. Sibbe, assistant director of the patent section, and Walter C. Middleton, supervisory attorney and security officer.

Sibbe, who resides with his wife at 341 Wimbeldon, Birmingham, "has no definite plans" for retirement, other than to do some traveling. The Middletons, 2283 West Maple Road, Birmingham, plan to reside in Cape Coral, Fla.

SIBBE was born in Superior, Wis., and received a bachelor of science degree in mechanical engineering from the University of Wisconsin and a bachelor of laws degree from George Washington University.

He joined GM in 1948 after 24 years of patent work in industrial and private practice. He was named assistant director of the GM patent section in 1958.

Sibbe is a member of the District of Columbia and Michigan bars, American Bar Association, American Juridical Society and the American and Michigan Patent Law Associations.

MIDDLETON was born in Decatur, Ala., and received a bachelor of science degree in electrical engineering from Alabama Polytechnic Institute and a bachelor of laws degree from Brooklyn Law School.

He was engaged in the field of patent law for 29 years prior to joining GM in 1952. Middleton is a member of the New York and Michigan bars and the Michigan Patent Law Association.

Adams, near the fire station, and Willis and Greenwood.

On the commercial side of the ledger, new buildings have been constructed on Pierce, Brown, Purdy, N. Woodward and E. Lincoln.

In the downtown area the Harmon Office Building has been built at 484 Pierce. Two new buildings are going up on Brown; a \$35,000 permit was issued for 123 W. Brown and a \$50,000 permit for 199 W. Brown.

THE BIRMINGHAM Psychiatric Clinic at 625, Purdy underwent an extensive rebuilding program this spring. The permit was issued for \$45,000.

A \$110,500 permit was issued in June for the construction of a new office at 430 N. Woodward and a \$19,500 permit for a new gas station at 1599 N. Woodward.

Also in July, an \$84,000 permit was issued to the Inter-State Tool Co. for the construction of a tool shop at 2385 E. Lincoln.

Thus far in August the largest commercial permits have been issued for a \$200,000 office building at 115 W. Brown and a \$16,000 storage shed at 2091 Holland.

PRIVATE PROPERTY owners aren't the only individuals carrying on construction projects this summer.

The City of Birmingham is doing work on the \$450,000 golf course and recreation facility at Lincoln and Cranbrook roads and will soon begin construction of a seventh municipal parking lot in the block south of Shain Park in the southwest quadrant of the central business district.

Set Registration For Fall Classes
