Schools to Operate Without Curtailment

By eliminating planned expansion and making a change in fiscal years, the Oakland School Board can operate for the current fiscal year without curtailment of the present program.

If Supt. William J. Emerson's spending program goes as planned, the Oakland Intermediate School district will finish the year on June 30 with a surplus of \$83,412.

A record operating budget of \$290,853 was approved by the Oakland School Board last Thursday. However, this amount was below the \$370,000 budget and \$130,000 surplus Emerson had hoped for.

THE MEETING Thursday was attended only by Emerson, Deputy Supt. Kenneth Brown and four trustees.

Anti-Noise Law Is Adopted in Bloomfield Twp.

An ordinance to control excessive noise was adopted by Bloomfield Township at its board meeting Monday night.

It specifically controls construction noises, including street excavation. Work before 7 a.m. and after 6 p.m. is prohibited except upon receipt of a permit by the township supervisor.

After further study, other noise nuisances will be included in the ordinance.

OTHER ACTION by the township board included rezoning of 300 feet on Woodward and 200 feet on Reswell from multiple to business classification. Lewis Furniture Co. will erect a store on the site.

The change was recommended by the township planning commission. It was opposed by owners of a neighboring residence, John Roth and Norman Hancock, who were represented by attorney Larry Maloney.

Trustee Robert Sinclair voted against the rezoning.

THE BOARD accepted Hickory Grove water mains and sewers into the township system, subject to review and approval by township attorney Tom Dillon.

It also gave approval to Oakland County DPW to hire the engineering firm of Hubbell, Roth and Clark for inspection services on the Oakland County Water System for Bloomfield Township.

Approval was also granted to enlarge space in Saven Drug Store, Telegraph at Maple, for the store's SDD and SDM business.

Emerson's budget proposal was based on revenue from one-tenth of a mill, the amount allotted by Oakland County Tax Allocation Board. Having the budget submitted to the school board members said it was the best that could be done and approved it.

A special education budget of \$22,000 was also approved by the board. This budget is financed by a half-mill county tax approved by voters in the early 1950s.

The cut-back in the operating budget eliminated two reading clinicians who were paid a total of about \$5,000.

THE PLANNED spending program expects revenues of \$363,555 and expenses totaling \$280,550. This would leave a surplus of \$83,412.

Emerson is worried about the financial situation of the Oakland School Offices from July to December 1964, when no tax revenue will be coming in.

He wanted a \$130,000 surplus to be accumulated to cover operating expenses for this period and avoid borrowing necessary funds.

Boys Peddle 900 Miles By Bicycle

Council Adds Stipulation to Pulte Request

BEVERLY HILLS.—A stipulation that property be restored after the building of water mains along Linschme Drive has been added to permission given Beechgrove Investment Co. for construction of the mains in Metamora Green at 13 Mile Road and Lahar.

The action was taken at a special council meeting Monday.

William J. Pulte, developer of Metamora Green, is constructing the mains at his own cost. The council wanted to insure proper restoration of property on homes already existing in the subdivision. The standards of restoration must comply with the village engineer's specifications.

THE COUNCIL also moved to express its favorable attitude toward construction of a Pony & Colt League baseball diamond within the confines of Southfield Park.

Officials of the league, which has two divisions for boys 15 to 16 years of age, want to build a regular diamond, with cement dugouts and fences in the park.

The group will need special permission to reserve the diamond at their proposed times, 5 to 7:45 p.m. weekdays, and 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturdays, but would not have a claim on the diamond, as the park is public property.

Plan Eight Lanes For Telegraph Rd.

State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie has approved a plan to build additional lanes to make Telegraph Road (MS-24) a divided eight-lane highway between Grand River and I-696 in Detroit and Southfield.

Total cost of the four-mile long project, scheduled to be put under contract in 1965, will be an estimated \$2.3 million. Telegraph Road is one of the most heavily traveled highways in Wayne and Oakland counties, is now a six-lane divided highway between Grand River and Eight Mile road (M-102) and a four-lane divided highway from there to I-696 at Northwestern Highway.

Williamson Trial On Fraud Counts To Start Oct. 1

After more than a year of legal delays, the trial of former Birmingham resident Stewart Gordon Williamson on charges of fraud will get underway in Oakland County Circuit Court on Oct. 1.

Williamson, who lived at 1307 1/2 Davis, pleaded not guilty at his arraignment before Judge Clark Adams Monday. He is charged with larceny by conversion, gross fraud and cheat and false pretenses.

He has been accused of absconding with an estimated \$15,000 invested by Birmingham area residents in a bowling company.

ACCORDING to Birmingham Detective Richard Chambers, Williamson entered in agreements with several investors to produce special polyethylene plastic pins and to sell franchises for their distribution. He sold the franchises but did not produce the pins, Chambers said.

Williamson, who was arrested in California in April, 1962, was extradited to Birmingham.

Oakland School Offices will conduct a study of methods to prepare youth for earning a living.

Research by William F. Moorhouse, Oakland School Offices guidance director, will be financed by a \$43,000 grant in National Defense Education Act funds.

THE STUDY is part of a nationwide attack on unemployment. Its objective is perfection of testing and guidance techniques for students unable to attend college.

While Moorhouse works on the two-year study, a teacher will be hired to handle some of his regular duties.
