She studied at the Juliard School of Music and at the Chicago Conservatory, becoming a professional concert singer. She sang with the San Carlo Opera Co. and the Cincinnati Opera Co. She has also been on concert tours in Israel, Poland and other European countries, and in Mexico and Argentina.

At the end of World War II, she was sent by the World Jewish Congress on a cultural mission to the DP camps. Mrs. Schaver was the first to record the Ghetto and Partisan songs of the victims of the Nazi holocaust. During the Israeli War of Liberation she gave 30 concerts before the soldiers. In 1963 she composed and sang "An Ode to Eleanor Roosevelt" at a rally in the Waldorf Astoria, N.Y. Mrs. Schaver and her late husband, who was a lifelong Labor Zionist, have been active in many communal, philanthropic and cultural endeavors.
