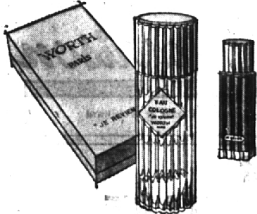

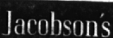

There will be a business meeting at 7:45 p.m., at which time the Sidelineers and new members will be honored. There will also be a memorial.

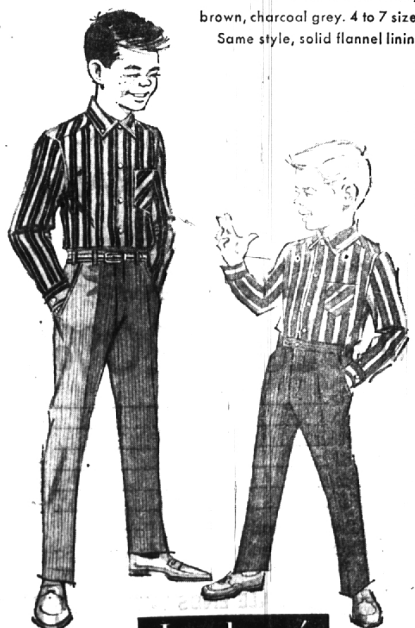
