Phil, Kenzie, Dick and Lynn Moon met the Viennese family on a skiing vacation at Kitzbuhel, Austria—became good friends and Lynn was invited to return as a summer guest.

"Don't worry, it's only the usual earthquake season here," were Lynn's reassuring words in a letter from Dubrovnik, Yugoslavia, where tremors were felt from the disaster at Skopje (180 miles away).

The quake provided only minor distraction to the Singers' guests (among the eight, seven different languages were spoken), who spent three weeks together in a resort cottage at Dubrovnik.
