DIAL YOUR WAY TO ...

BRIDGE
 in BIRMINGHAM

When the scoring was over at a recent master-point game at the Birmingham YMCA, I couldn't help but overhear someone express surprise at the fact that Ollie Swartzwelder hadn't won.

I believe I have her name among the winners most weeks.

Today's hand was played by Mae Esch, and as you may imagine, her partner was Ollie. You may remember this hand that some played in less than game, and made three spades, and most players who played it at game went down one.

MY COMMENT on the bidding is that it was aggressive but well within reason. Most declarers lost one trick in each suit, but Mae could see the light in how to avoid the club loser.

West's opening lead of the jack of hearts was won in the closed hand and the King of Spades returned. West had hopes of a heart ruff so he went up with the ace of trump and returned his low heart. East won this trick with the king and returned the queen of hearts which was ruffed by Mae with the ten of spades. She now exhausted the opponent's trump, winding up in dummy and led a low club and hooked the Jack.

MAE'S PLAN to avoid a club loser was to squeeze East and force East into an end play. To do this, she now pulled all her trump and the ace of diamonds, leaving each hand with three cards. East had to protect the king of clubs so his last three cards were the two of clubs and the king of diamonds, and East had to play away from the king of clubs.

University Center Announces Faculty

A consulting psychologist, a newspaperman, a humanities teacher, and four science professors will comprise the faculty teaching this fall's non-credit courses offered Birmingham-Bloomfield Hills adults by the University Center for Adult Education.

The center is sponsored by Wayne State University, the University of Michigan and Eastern Michigan University.

Dr. Joan Chodoroff, psychologist, who has done clinical work with both parents and children and has engaged in research in child development, will conduct a course in "Behavior Difficulties of the Normal Child."

Detroit News foreign news analyst Russell Barnes will direct a series of classes on "Current Developments in U. S. Foreign Policy."

"DEVELOPMENTS of Western Culture" will be taught by Wayne State University humanities instructor William Hanford.

In the natural science field, Dr. Karl F. Lagler, professor and chairman of the University of Michigan Department of Fisheries, will have a course on "Michigan Fish and Fishing," while lecturers for a course in ornithology will include U. of M. faculty men Dr. Andrew J. Berger, associate professor of anatomy; Dr. Robert W. Storer, associate professor of zoology; and Dr. Harrison B. Tordoff, professor of zoology.

Both Dr. Storer and Dr. Tordoff are curators of birds in the university's Museum of Zoology.

Still to be announced is the instructor for a course in "Twentieth-Century British and American Literature."

Classes will be held at Baldwin Public Library, Seaholm High School and the Cranbrook Institute of Science. Brochures describing the courses may be secured at the library. Registration begins Tuesday.
