

YMCA Schedules An Original Reading

"The House," an original reading written by Charles Bigelow, will be performed at the Birmingham YMCA at 8 p.m. Friday.

The reading, which runs for about 60 minutes, is a comedy, although it deals with serious problems.

The characters in "The House" include revamped versions of the three Fates, a killer with a monogamous laugh, a married couple who live in the house, their two cretin sons, a man with a toy trumpet and a bear who is a visitor from "outside."

BIGELOW wrote "The House" last year as part of a thesis for a special English course at Cranbrook School. "The House" was originally a three-act play in the style of the Theater of the Absurd, but the author has since adapted it to be performed as a reading.

Bigelow, who will be a freshman at Reed College this fall, was the top winner in last year's Southwestern Michigan Scholastic Writing Awards contest. He is an important member of the cast, as well as being the author of the play.

HENRY WEIL, a member of the Yale Dramatic Association, has directed the reading. He also plays one of the lead roles in the production.

The other members of the cast, all college students from the Birmingham area, are Lin Harvey, Marcia Reinitt, Anne d'Hyvres, Claudia Coleman, Tom Roper, Michael Barone, Jim McQuaid, and Peter Norman, who first organized the reading about a month ago.

Ruth Chodoroff and Sam Smith have also been involved in the production.

Special Cuts Of Meat Give More Meals

With imagination a great variety of meals may be planned with a small budget if homemakers have their butchers prepare meats to fit their needs, say food specialists at The University of Michigan Medical Center.

In recommending "more meals from meat" to cut family food costs, the dietitians report that several meals for a family of four may be obtained from one cut of meat.

A GENEROUS beef arm pot roast will provide two meals for a family of four. It may be rolled into an ample boneless pot roast with enough left for hearty Swiss steaks.

Three different meals may be obtained from a pork Boston butt. An easy-to-carve boneless roast and braised boneless steaks contribute to two delicious meals.

Boneless cooked meat from the blade piece makes an economical third meal.

A leg of lamb may provide a tasty center-cut roast, broiled sirloin chops and tender stew meat.

- For most lawns the height of cut should be 2". This is because only in the grass blade is the fertilizer changed to a usable food. A short blade thus cannot produce enough food to really develop the health, vigor and root system of the plant.

- Watering. Frequent shallow watering encourages shallow rooted plants such as bent grass, rye grass, crab & quack grass, chickweed, etc. It also encourages blue grass and fescue roots to move toward the surface where they can easily burn out. Water DEEPLY—ONCE A WEEK.

- Many lawns have suffered from severe fungus problems to a degree we have not seen for many years.

If the development or enlargement of dead areas is increasing, you should spray twice, 5 days apart, with Acti-Dion RZ — then fertilize properly — then about the 10th or 15th of September rake out the spots that don't recover and seed them lightly.

- PEACHES:—Now the fruit moth will enter the peach instead of the twig. SEVIN or MALATHION.
- CORN:—The ear worm is imminent. Use SEVIN for ear worm and borer. Corn just coming into silk is in danger. TOMORROW (Friday) spray lower stalks every 3 days and give the EARS a special shot.
