Denyes Appointed To Zoning Board

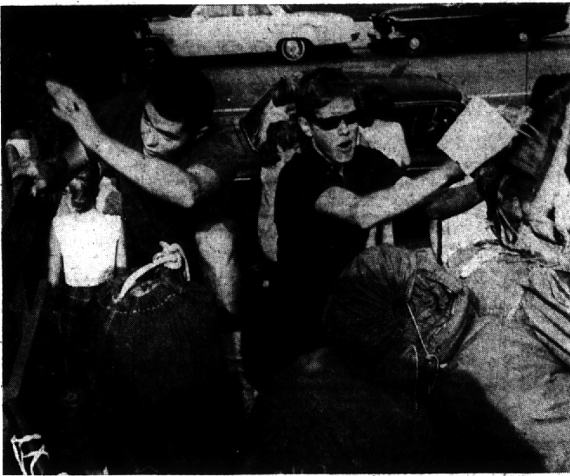
Harry M. Denyes, Jr., former mayor, city commissioner and plan board member—has been appointed to the Birmingham Board of Zoning Appeals.

Robinson was nominated by Commissioner David F. Breck.

"Anything out of the downtown area would not be feasible," he said. "Under these circumstances," said Renfrew, "I believe it would be most difficult to find any basis to encourage you in that action."

BAWDEN SUGGESTED that the City explore the prospect of condemnation with the idea of using part of the property for the Society's purpose.

Commissioner David Breck pressed for a legal opinion, and Howlett was asked to report at next week's meeting.

Three Highland Park youths were arrested by Bloomfield Hills police Monday on charges of breaking and entering a Bloomfield Hills home.

Donald Kerr, 17, Carlos Santos, 18, and a third boy, 15, all pleaded guilty when arraigned before Judge A. J. Richardson Tuesday.

Police received a call from Robert L. Biggers, 305 Lakewood, around 4 p.m. Monday reporting that his home had been broken into.

BIGGERS TOLD police burglars had taken a portable television set, a transistor radio, a movie camera and case, several watches, cuff links and other smaller items.

When investigating the area, Police Sgt. Ralph Powell discovered the stolen merchandise in a sleeping bag hidden in the marsh of Endicot Lake, about 300 feet from the Biggers residence.

Powell and Police Capt. Walter Sluiter removed the items, left the bag and staked themselves out in the area at 8 p.m.

ABOUT 9:30 that night, two youths appeared, discovered the missing goods and fled the scene. Police cars and a dog were unable to find the boys, but officers discovered Kerr's name on the sleeping bag and sent to his home at 71 Cortland in Highland Park.

Kerr told police he had been fishing in the lake but knew nothing of the incident. He said he had left his sleeping bag there.

However, Sluiter said further investigation enabled police to obtain the names of the other two youths who refused to let police

in their room when officers went to Santos' home.

AFTER THROWING two watches out the window, the boys let officers in and confessed their crime.

The 15-year-old admitted slaughtering clothes, furniture, bedding and drapes with a machete. He is a ward of the court of Flint.

After arraignment, Kerr and Santos were turned over to circuit court. The other youth was taken back to Flint by Genesee County authorities.

SLUITER SAID they had entered the house through a rear screen on the back porch and then broken a small window in the living room.

Police estimated damages to be over \$900.

Two College Men Attend Conference Of Phi Gamma Delta

Two young men from Birmingham attended the 1953 Phi Gamma Delta conference for undergraduate chapter officers of Phi Gamma Delta, national men's college fraternity, at Indiana University last weekend.

They are Thomas L. Burgum, 1133 Westwood, Birmingham, son of Birmingham Mayor William H. Burgum, and James Posther, 1220 Stanley, Birmingham.

Burgum is a senior at DePaul University, where he is president of Phi Gamma Delta. Posther is a junior at the University of Michigan and rush chairman of his Phi Gamma Delta chapter.

Delay Action On Bids for 2 Access Drives

Due to a parking-zoning problem, city commissioners are delaying action on the low bid for the construction of two access drives in Birmingham.

One is to be on the east side of Hunter just south of Maple adjacent to the Birmingham House Motel.

The other will be on the west side of Woodward north of Smith. City Manager L. R. Gare explained that a problem has arisen in respect to the number of parking spaces which the motel must provide.

The motel will take its case before the Birmingham Board of Zoning Appeals at its Sept. 17 meeting.

PLANS CALL for a tower as part of an addition to the motel. This tower would have meeting rooms, and the zoning ordinance calls for a specific number of parking places for public assembly. The plans do not allow for the required spaces.

Commissioners agreed to hold off the awarding of the contract to Alva L. Greer and Sons of Roseville on its low bid of \$5,585.80 pending a decision from the appeals board.

City Okays Paving Bid In Lathrup

LATHRUP—A \$5,630 contract for the concrete paving of Elderado Place from W. Goldengate to California has been awarded to the J. D. Armstrong Co.

The council, which had previously rejected the firm's bid because it was the only one, followed City Administrator Jerald D. Stone's recommendation Tuesday night on the project, dating from a 1953 special assessment program.

STONE PRESENTED an alternate bid of \$7,695 from a Roseville firm. He had been asked at a previous meeting to come up with comparative prices.

The council also authorized Stone to have city crews do the work on the paving of 150 feet of Goldengate which will complete the 1959 program.
