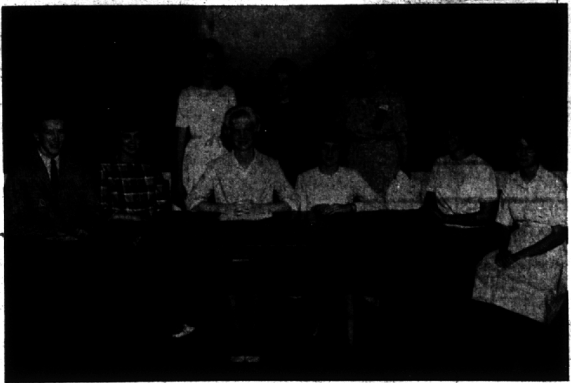
## B'ham Authorizes Beer, Wine License For Tony's, Inc.

## Commission Approves Lot Rezoning

Birmingham city commissioners Tuesday night approved the rezoning of three lots on the northwest corner of Eton and Yosemite from B-2, neighborhood business, to R-6, multiple family.

Commissioners accepted the recommendation of the planning board.

The planners reasoned that the property in question is in an area of residential property in the multiple family category.

The physical condition of the land is such that it would not be feasible for business purposes, they stated.

COMMISSIONERS adjourned for one week a proposal to vacate a portion of the cul de sac at the east end of the alley running from Columbia eastward toward Eton.

City Manager L. R. Gare said the owner of the property being rezoned is to bring in an agreement reached between the owner and the city attorney and suggested that the hearing be continued until next week.

its Aug. 29 meeting — that "all activities of the association insofar as junior members are concerned shall be suspended until further action of the board (of directors of TAE)."

ATTACHED TO the letter to Hollingshead was a letter, dated Sept. 3, sent to the parents of TAE junior members.

In addition to advising the parents of the board of director's decision on activities of the junior members, the letter stated that the TAE board had adopted no policy regarding the signing or not signing of the statements presented to students and their parents for signature as regards membership in the so-called fraternities and sororities."

The letter went on to say "that the TAE board believed such a requirement was in violation of rights under the 14th Amendment.

SUCH A STATEMENT, along with a letter to parents, has been drawn up by the school system. It is dated "September, 1963." This letter notes that:

"The pupil will also be required, as a condition of receiving credit, promotion, or graduation, to sign a statement at the end of the school year indicating the fact that he or she has not been a member of a high school fraternity, sorority, or secret society, as defined by law, at any time during the school year."

The letter will be sent to parents shortly after school begins.

ONE OF THE four boys appearing before the board of education, who said he was president of Alpha Omega (AO), told the board that he had that afternoon received a call from AO's attorney, Norman Kapcia.

The attorney told him, he said, that there would be a special meeting of the board that evening and that he should gather together papers of AO and present them to the board.

The boy noted that he had not had much time to gather and organize the documents. "The only document which he presented was a certificate of association of AO for 1963 filed with the county clerk, dated December, 1962 (prior to "the crackdown")."

EARLIER THEIR attorney had filed an undated copy of the group's constitution with the board.

The attorney (in a letter to Oakland County Prosecutor George Taylor, with a copy to the board of education) has contended that AO was not within the statutory definition of a secret society because it ceased to exist within one year.

A letter from Taylor to the attorney (whom the boy said the organization was no longer able financially to retain) read:

"We do not believe that by merely inserting an article in the constitution stating that the organization shall cease to exist after one year and thereby supposedly being 'non-perpetuating' that the dictates of the statute can be avoided unless there is de facto cessation in all functions and membership of the present organization."

"WE DO NOT believe that the legislative intent can be circumvented by a technicality in a self-serving statement by the organization in question that it will cease to exist after one year while continuing its same organization and self-perpetuating membership on a year to year basis under different names."

THE THREE other boys, in order of their appearance before the board, were the vice president of AO, the vice president of MSCP and a member of SDT.

## 2 WOMEN TERRORIZED

# Hunt Masked Robbers Of Bloomfield Home

Police continued to search for clues to the identity of two masked bandits who terrorized the wife and maid of a Bloomfield Hills physician Saturday.

Capt. Walter Sluiter, head of the Hills police department, Wednesday sent scraps of wire and pieces of electrical detonating caps used in an attempt to blow open a safe to the State Police crime laboratory for chemical tests.

Mrs. Edward J. Priabe, 260 Havenhill, and the maid, Loraine Linn of Detroit, were left handcuffed to a pole in the basement of the \$100,000 home while the bandits escaped in a late-model Cadillac with \$2,200 in cash and jewelry valued at more than \$5,000.

MRS. PRISBE told police that the intruders, one armed with a pistol, entered the house through an unlocked kitchen door. Dr. Priabe was not at home.

One of the men slapped her across the face until she revealed the location of the safe in the bedroom closet, she said. When they opened the closet door, they found Miss Linn hiding behind a clothes rack.

The duo used explosives, muffled by pillows and towels, in a futile attempt to blast open the safe, which according to Mrs. Priabe, contained a marriage license and insurance papers, but no money.

THE BANDITS took \$2,200 from a dresser drawer, two wrist watches and a diamond engagement ring belonging to Mrs. Priabe.

The men, wearing big-nosed Halloween masks, bound the two women with metal handcuffs. Miss Linn managed to work her hands free and notified a neighbor of the robbery.

Capt. Sluiter said the bandits wore gloves throughout the robbery, eliminating the possibility of tracing them by fingerprints.

He said other area police departments are cooperating in the search.

THE MAID told police she saw a third man, presumably acting as a lookout, waiting outside in the getaway car.

Sluiter said he thought that dynamite caps were used in the attempt to open the safe, and not nitroglycerin as originally supposed.
