Area Residents To Exhibit at Antique Show

Grange Hall, a landmark in Plymouth, Mich., will be one of the locations of the antique show and sale during the upcoming Fall Festival, Sept. 6 through 8.

The building was originally a stable and carriage house. Built in the 1840s by Philip Markham, pioneer air-ride manufacturer in Plymouth.

Karl H. Starkweather, lifetime resident of Plymouth, recalls that Markham believed that horseless carriages were a passing fancy and that the horse would continue to be the favored means of reliable transportation.

However, in 1912, Markham's stable was sold to the Farmer's Building Association, which proceeded to erect the horses and remodel the building into quarters for the Plymouth Grange, which purpose it has served for the past 50 years.

The Antique Show's hours are noon until 10 p.m. on Friday and Saturday and noon until 8 p.m. on Sunday.
