Electromagnetism is not new to science. It was first discovered by Oersted, a famous Danish Physicist, in 1819. 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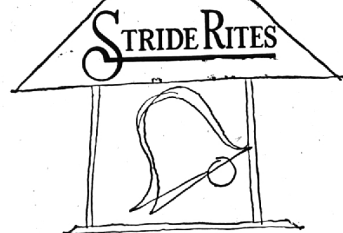

Sorority to Hold Potluck Luncheon

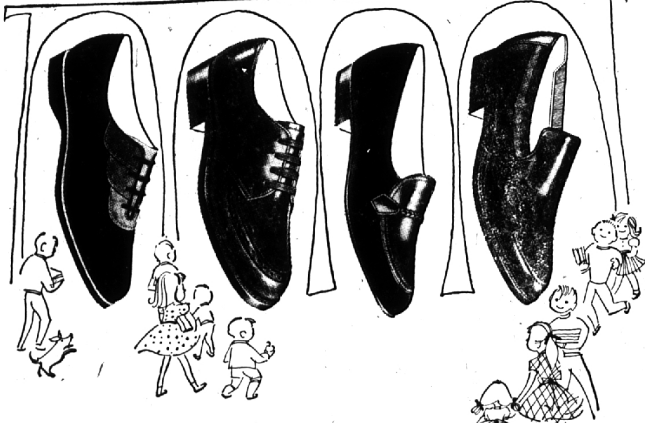
