idea of monopoly conditions within the labor movement (as it does in the areas of private enterprise), railroad unions will have power that exceeds even the existing powers of Congress and the courts.

Labor's monopoly fits into the axiom that "monopoly begets power and absolute monopoly begets absolute power."

And, fellow-American, do you know why labor still has monopoly power? The answer is an easy one: because Congress is afraid (repeat: AFRAID) to lose some votes for its members; also because the Chief Executive (whoever he may have been or currently is) is too cowardly to fight for the right to apply the benefits of anti-monopoly to the whole structure of the free enterprise system.

For, if monopoly is opposed in private business affairs because it is harmful to the free competitive system, then monopoly's evils are equally applicable to the rights of collective bargaining!

In brief, COLLECTIVE BARGAINING CAN NOT EXIST WITHIN THE PRECINCTS OF MONOPOLY!

For many, many centuries mankind has sought the secrets of both the seen and the unseen worlds of life. Already great minds have learned from the actions and re-reactions of the physical world many of Nature's laws. Too, in the realms of the mental and spiritual, mankind has made great findings . . . and these are written on papyrus, paper, or marble, and the enduring tablets of the heart. This does God inform!

spread the word among their friends that Birmingham doesn't treat speeding cases lightly," Moxley said.

He said the word of mouth technique has had a strong effect on the teens.

The chief said Birmingham's ordinance that makes it unlawful for an automobile to enter a race on a public highway has also helped the police in their enforcement.

BEFORE THE ordinance was enacted last spring, police were forced to pace speeders or charge them with reckless driving.

"We're getting the problem under control but it's not solved yet," Moxley said.

Bloomfield Hills Public Safety Director Robert J. Stadler said he thought the speeders were "slowing up a bit."

Stadler attributed some of the slowdown to the fact that many youngsters had returned to school.

On Tuesday, two Woodward speeders received 10-day jail sentences in Bloomfield Hills.

Ednan Swiden, 20, of Pontiac, and Jerome Carter, 20, of Drayton Plains, were both found guilty of reckless driving and were sent to the Oakland County Jail when they were unable to pay \$100 fines.

BLOOMFIELD Township Police Chief Norman Dehnke was a little more pessimistic about the Woodward problem.

"It's about the same as it has been for the last five or six years," Dehnke said.

"Just about the time you ease up on the enforcement the trouble starts all over again," he said.

The township has two cars—one marked and one semi-marked—assigned to patrol Woodward on Friday and Saturday nights.

These developments all have occurred since The Eccentric first brought to light the problem of teen-age drivers on Woodward Ave. in its Aug. 15 issue.

Daily newspapers in Detroit, Royal Oak and Pontiac and area radio-TV stations carried stories on the matter since then.

B'field Delays Zoning Action; Sets Plans for Joint Study

The Bloomfield Hills City Commission has postponed action on the proposed new zoning ordinance until a joint meeting with the city planning commission can be scheduled.

In their monthly meeting Tuesday, the commissioners agreed unanimously they could not take a definite stand on the plan without knowing the reasons behind the proposed zoning changes.

Commissioner David W. Lee read a list of personal objections to the text of the proposal.

"ALMOST every page contains minor points that will need thrashing out. Many definitions are vague and poorly worded," Lee said. Using a map, Lee also pointed out areas that the proposed ordinance downgrades in acreage for reasons which he could not understand.

"There may be good reasons why the planning commission has designated these areas to be downgraded, but I want to consult with them and see why it is," he said.

Commissioner Henry L. Woolfenden also disagreed with parts of the proposed text.

"THE PROPOSED plan calls for an increasing of the business section from 27 acres to 49. I am opposed to this increase, and feel the people want to keep Bloomfield predominantly a single-dwelling area," he said.

Woolfenden also shared Lee's dim view of increasing the density of multiple dwellings per acre to 4.69.

Several Bloomfield residents spoke against enlarging the business section in the proposed plan, and expressed the desire to maintain the permanent green-belt segregating the residential section from the commercial in the area of Guilford Road.

Commissioner Louis J. Colombo, Jr., said the best solution was a work session where the proposed plan could be worked out in detail. All commissioners agreed.

"This is an important thing; it is something that will last for years. I feel that a work session of the planning commission, city commission and planning consultant is of necessity," Mayor Lyman Craig advised.

The commission met Monday night for the joint meeting; however, it was learned that Villan-Lemans Associates, planning consultants, could not attend.

PLANS FOR a new date, before next month's commission meeting, are underway.

"A joint session with the planning commission will enable us to learn all the reasons and facts in this proposed document, take a definite stand and make it available to the people," Lee said.

In other action, the commission approved the undertaking of a survey to determine the need to make it over.

Asked for further study of a new water main which would traverse along Long Lake Road and intersect with the township's line at Squirel Road at an estimated cost of \$1¼ million, the proposed line would provide a complete water system to Bloomfield Hills residents. The commissioners asked to have a complete, detailed study made available for next month's meeting.

Decision Due Friday in Hills Board Suit

A decision on whether construction on a three-room addition at Hickory Grove School in Bloomfield Hills will be allowed to continue will be handed down in Oakland County Circuit Court at 1:30 p.m. Friday.

Schwanz Construction Co. of Bloomfield Township requested a show cause hearing Monday in an effort to halt construction on the project, being built by the Bersche Construction Co. of Pontiac.

SCHWANZ CHARGES that the school board wasted about \$800 of public money in awarding the \$4,650 contract to Bersche, instead of Schwanz, the low bidder. Attorneys for the construction firm and the school board asked that the decision be delayed in order that additional information might be presented. Judge Frederick C. Ziem set a deadline of Wednesday afternoon for the presentation.

Construction is continuing on the addition, Bloomfield Supt. of Schools Eugene Johnson said Wednesday, and is slightly ahead of schedule. Completion date on the project is mid-November.
