**New Judges Sworn in for Circuit Court**

Two new judges, appointed by Gov. George Romney, to fill two new posts created by the State Legislature this year, were sworn into office Sept. 6 for the Oakland County Circuit Court.

James S. Thorburn, 44, of Pontiac, both attorneys and World War II veterans, became the sixth and seventh judges of the county circuit court.

THEY WERE sworn in by Daniel T. Murphy, county clerk-registrar, at the public opening of the new supervisors auditorium in the Oakland County Service Center.

Circuit Judge Frederick C. Ziem presided over the ceremonies. Special guests, among a crowd of approximately 500 persons, were State Supreme Court Justice Michael D. O'Hara and Cong. William S. Broomfield.

**Middlebelt-Maple Corner Concerns W. B'field Board**

The accident-prone corner of Middlebelt and Maple got a verbal going-over by West Bloomfield Township Board members at their meeting last week.

A recommendation from the Township Planning Commission for improvement of the intersection was discussed at length. The recommendation called for widening of both roads to provide left-hand turning lanes.

However, some board members felt that hill crests at the intersection were greatly responsible for the large number of accidents and suggested that raising the road level to increase visibility might be the answer.

FINAL CONCLUSION by the board was to ask the Oakland County Road Commission to make a study of the intersection and come up with answers as to what should be done to make it safer.

In July there were four accidents at the Maple-Middlebelt intersection and in August, three more. It is one of the three most dangerous intersections in the township, police statistics show.
