The party will adhere to its hobo theme with a large pot of stew on an outdoor fire. Bread will be passed around in large loaves and homemade apple pie will be plentiful.

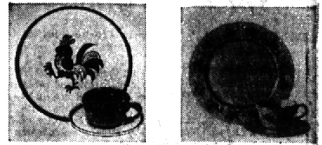

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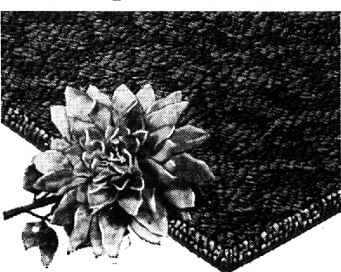
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
