### Oakland Activities Welcome Freshmen

Oakland University welcomed its fifth freshman class with a flourish.

Classes began Friday at Oakland for approximately 650 new students and 800 upperclassmen, but a schedule of special events started Sunday when new students arrived on campus. The program was planned to help them feel at home.

A hootenanny attracted a standing-room-only audience in the Gold Room of Oakland Center. Swim parties, dances, cookouts, movies, open house in residence halls and a jazz concert were intermixed with the business of testing, freshman convocation and registration.

STUDENTS and their parents were greeted at the campus entrance by upperclassmen who directed traffic and distributed programs.

Many new friendships began as resident advisers showed students to their rooms and introduced them to their roommates.

A reception for the parents was held in the Oakland Center lounge where Chancellor D. B. Varner told them that "in addition to being the largest class, it is the best class in academic quality in the history of the institution."

Chancellor Varner said it is the responsibility of the parents and the institution to give the students the best undergraduate educational experience possible in eight semesters.

THE YEAR-ROUND program, in which a student can graduate in two and two-thirds years, has been in operation at Oakland for two years for freshmen and sophomores and will include juniors and seniors this year.

Faculty and staff members were on hand to answer questions of the parents. The faculty also met with the students for an informal discussion.

Speaker at the convocation of freshmen was Dr. James C. Haden, professor and chairman of the philosophy department, who told them he hoped they would not be security-seekers.
