

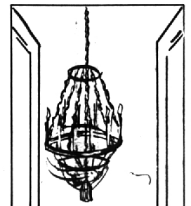
Southfield VFW Holds Program for Membership Drive

These Constellations In September Skies

Here are some of the constellations to look for in the September night skies, according to University of Michigan Astronomer Hazel M. Loah.

Auriga (The Charioteer): Rising in the northeast soon after dark, this star group includes Capella. Because of its brilliance and beauty, Capella is a star famous in the history of all ages.

The figure of Auriga is traced out by connecting five stars, including Capella, making a clearly defined five-sided figure or pentagon, says Professor Loah.

Aries (The Ram): A small but important constellation in the east, it is made up of three main stars. "The importance of this star-figure lies in the fact that it is the first sign of the zodiac, the imaginary pathway in the sky along which the sun, moon, and planets appear to travel eastward during the year."

Pisces (The Fishes): To the right and below Aries is found The Fishes, in which the planet Jupiter finds itself at the present time. Two lines of faint stars from a crude letter "V."

Aquarius (The Water Carrier): It is the next constellation of the zodiac to the west of The Fishes. "Aquarius owes his reputation to being a member of the zodiac, and represents an old man pouring water from a jar."

Capricornus (The Sea Goat): Most of the stars in this constellation are faint. Rising in the southeast, the Sea Goat looks more like a cocked hat resting on its crown than a goat. The Planet Saturn is found in this constellation at the present time.

School Bus Law Passed On Unloading

A new law, effective last Friday, requires school buses to pull off the pavement whenever possible to load or unload children.

Erwin Hendershot, director of bus transportation for Oakland Schools, said the new regulation will permit a motorist to pass a school bus which has pulled off the road after the red light has stopped flashing.

THE MOTORIST is required to stop first and then proceed past the bus no faster than 10 miles per hour.

The purpose of the law, Hendershot explained, is to maintain the flow of traffic as well as to provide for the safety of school children.

The law is stated in Section 682, paragraph B, of the Motor Vehicle Code.
