## Mackie Favors Earlier Interstate Completion

State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie has said that he favors a proposal to complete the 41,000-mile interstate highway system two years ahead of schedule.

"America is growing at a faster rate than Congress anticipated when it passed the Interstate Highway Act in 1956, and our traffic problems are multiplying," Mackie told the annual summer meeting of the Michigan Road Builders Association.

"Everyone would benefit if the Interstate System were completed ahead of schedule. It would save additional thousands of lives and at the same time help the nation's economy."

SEN. VANCE Hartke, D-Ind. has introduced a bill calling for Interstate to be completed by June of 1970 rather than by 1972 as now provided by law.

Mackie said he would be satisfied if all Interstate highways in rural areas were completed by 1970 while the states could be given an additional year to build urban freeways.

Mackie also predicted that Congress will authorize an additional 10,000 to 20,000 miles of Interstate highways when the present system is built.

"America's motorists like what they've seen of the Interstate Highway System and want the system to be expanded," he said.

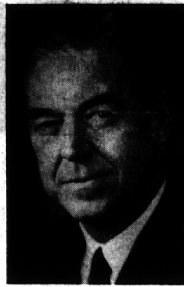
## Ford Executive Speaks to League On Foreign Policy

## Appointments Announced for Jesuit House

Two changes involving personnel at Manresa, the Jesuit Retreat House, Woodmont Ave. and Quenton Road, Bloomfield Hills, were recently announced by the Provincial of the Detroit Province of the Society of Jesus, the Very Rev. John A. McGrail, S.J.

The Rev. Bernard J. Wernert, S.J., has taken over the duties of director. Prior to this appointment, Fr. Wernert had been master of novices for both the Chicago and Detroit Provinces of the Jesuits, his last post being Colomiere College, Clarkston.

HE ENTERED the Jesuit Order in 1927 and was ordained a priest in 1939. He succeeds the Rev. Clement J. Singer, S.J. who has been transferred to Gesu Church in Detroit as an assistant pastor.

Assistant to Fr. Wernert and retreat-master for the weekend laymen retreats is the Rev. Robert A. Pollauf, S.J., for the last two years speech teacher and debate coach at the University of Detroit high school. This year his debate team won the Michigan state championship.

He succeeds the Rev. John J. O'Brien, S.J. who has been appointed to the Jesuit Retreat House in Cleveland.

Also at Manresa is the Rev. Paul W. Cavanaugh, S.J., director of Youth Retreats and twilight days of recollection.

Saled bids for the purchase of the above bonds will be received at the undersigned at the Township Hall, 4200 Fairview Road, Bloomfield Hills, Michigan, on the 23rd of Sept. 1963, until 12:00 o'clock in the afternoon, Eastern Time, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened and read.

Said Special Assessment Sanitary Sewer Bonds shall consist of \$27,000.00 (27) bonds of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, maturing commensurate in direct order of maturity from 1 to 27, both inclusive, will be dated May 1, 1963, and will mature serially as follows:

\$4,000.00	September 1, 1963;
\$2,000.00	September 1, 1964 and 1965;
\$2,000.00	September 1, 1966;
\$2,000.00	September 1, 1967.

Bonds numbered 22 to 27, both inclusive, maturing in the year 1967, may be redeemed at the option of the Township in inverse numerical order, on any interest payment date on or after September 1, 1964, at par and accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption. Notice of redemption shall be published here not less than thirty days prior to the date fixed for redemption in a bond newspaper.

Said bonds shall be coupon bonds and shall bear interest from their date at a rate or rates not exceeding four and one-half (4 1/2) per cent per annum, expressed in multiples of 1/8 of 1%. Said interest shall be payable on September 1, 1962, and semiannually thereafter after on March 1st and September 1st of each year. The interest rate for each coupon period on any one bond shall be at one rate only, and represented by one interest coupon. Both principal and interest will be payable at a bank or trust company to be selected by the original purchaser of the bonds, which paying agent shall be qualified as such under statutes of the State of Michigan or the Federal Government. Accrued interest to the date of delivery of such bonds shall be paid by the purchaser at time of delivery.

Said 1963 Special Assessment Sanitary Sewer Bonds are issued in anticipation of the collection of an equal amount of special assessments on Special Assessment Road No. 124.

In addition to special assessments, said bonds pledge the full faith, credit and resources of the Township of Bloomfield for their payment. Under the pledge of full faith and credit, in case of insufficiency of funds derived from collection of special assessments to pay the principal and interest on said bonds as the same become due, the Township of Bloomfield is required to pay the amount of such deficiency out of its general funds, or if necessary, levy taxes on all taxable property within its limits within the limits of taxation provided by the Constitution and laws of the State of Michigan.

For the purpose of awarding the bonds, the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from October 1, 1962 to their maturity and deducting therefrom any premium. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation produces the lowest interest cost to the Township. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the bonds herein offered or at a price less than their par value will be considered.

A certified or cashier's check to the amount of \$540.00, drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer of the Township of Bloomfield must accompany each bid as a guaranty of good faith on the part of the bidder. In the event the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds, no interest will be allowed on the good faith checks, and checks of unsuccessful bidders will be promptly returned to each bidder's representative or by registered mail.

Bids shall be conditioned upon the usual and ordinary conditions of Miller, Canfield, Faddock and Stone, attorneys of Detroit, Michigan, approving the legality of the bonds, which option will be furnished without expense to the purchaser of the bonds prior to delivery thereof. The Township will pay the cost of printing the bonds. The bonds will be delivered at Manresa, Michigan.
