

Motel on Telegraph Robbed by Bandit In Stocking Mask

Police are looking for a man who held up a Bloomfield Township motel manager early Monday morning.

James Edmond, manager of the Lee Motel, 2551 Telegraph, told police that a man wearing a black dress hat, a black topcoat, black trousers canvas work gloves and a nylon stocking over his head and carrying a gun entered the motel office about 4 a.m. and told him to empty the cash register.

The bandit, who netted \$70.80, was about five-feet-eight, weighed about 155 pounds and was about 50 years old, Edmond told police. He made his getaway in an old car, possibly a Chevrolet made between 1937 and 1940.

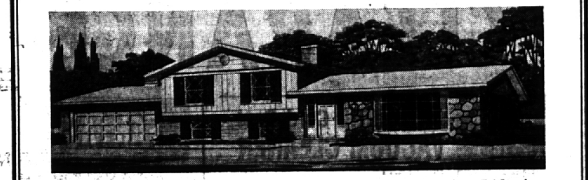

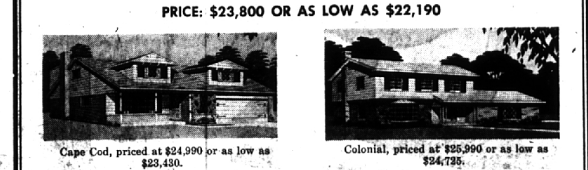

slaved six thousand people per hour during these 16 years. They have set up a Communist hideout in Cuba, just 90 miles from U. S. shores. All this since the end of World War II — supposedly fought to make the world safe for democracy. (Do you really believe that Soviet Russia can be trusted?)

Also! It's too often that the least of something valued is necessary to bring about the renewal of the effort to regain it. When abundant health is supplanted by illness, or when financial security is lost in the environment of improvident living—when such losses occur most persons then strive to regain them. Liberty, freedom suffer the same fate, so history states. "Water" isn't missed until the well "runs dry."

Talk about temperament! Take the cases of Danny Kaye and Judy Garland, who will do some TV programs for CBS this winter. Danny demanded a penthouse and Judy a special dressing room, each costing \$25,000. Of course, this comes out of the pocketbooks of the people who buy the stuff to be advertised on those TV programs. That's the "fringe benefit" over and above whatever regular compensation they get. How high is high, anyway?

If the U. S. Congress shows lack of courage to face up to the need for more disciplinary legislation for the cure of certain economic ills, cannot it be said that the vast majority of citizens are likewise afflicted? Surely, if the people were alert to their civic responsibilities, they would not tolerate the downright extravagance in the Federal Government, nor would they allow the Washington, D. C. politicians to tax them so heavily; neither let it concentrate more power there.
