

## Republicans Contact Neighbors for Funds

More than 8,500 Republican fund raisers launched a three-day neighbor-to-neighbor fund drive campaign Monday.

"These people have volunteered to call upon their neighbors, asking that they financially support the Republican Party," said Charles L. Lyle, Oakland County Republican chairman. A personal call on every Republican home in Oakland County was the goal.

MRS. JOHN Pfister, of Birmingham, chairman of the drive, will receive reports at a 7 p.m. meeting tomorrow at Devon Garden, 1116 W. Long Lake Rd., Bloomfield Hills.

Rep. William S. Broomfield will reveal his political plans at the meeting.

Broomfield, who for six years has been the Republican representative from the 18th Congressional District, will announce whether he will seek re-election to the same post or

will be a congressional candidate for the newly-created 19th District.

LYLE TOLD the volunteers that the party showed renewed strength. Last year only 1,500 volunteer fund-raisers participated in the drive. "We are thrilled and encouraged at this year's enthusiasm and interest," he said.

Setting the pace for the drive at the kickoff meeting was Mrs. George Romney, who told the group that "struggle is basic in a democracy and we must struggle if we are to have morality and integrity in government through citizen interest."
