The annual "Peanuts for Kids" sale conducted by the Kiwanis Club of Birmingham will be held throughout the Birmingham area Saturday.

Proceeds from the peanut sale will augment the club's Boys and Girls Fund which is used to help support a variety of activities benefiting local boys and girls.

A total of 2,464 students were registered in the Birmingham schools at the close of the second day of the term which opened Monday, it was announced yesterday by Superintendent Charles W. Crandall. This figure is 48 less than the number of registrations recorded on the same comparative date last year, when the total was 2,512 Mr. Crandall said.

A 350-foot relief sewer on Adams road between Lincoln and Woodward avenues could be constructed at a cost of \$4,853,20, it was estimated by Harold C. Corson, city engineer and acting treasurer, in a report submitted to the Commission Monday night. A delegation of residents have demanded relief from flooded sewer conditions in that area.

15 YEARS AGO

George A. Dondero and Howard R. Estes, seeking re-election as Congressional representative and state representative, respectively, from this area, greatly outdistanced their rivals in Tuesday's primary vote here, election results from Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills revealed. In Birmingham, 1,885 voters cast their ballot, while in Bloomfield Hills 199 electors visited the polls.

Dr. Dwight Ireland, superintendent of schools has announced an increase of approximately 200 students in the total enrollment of Birmingham schools this year. Last year's enrollment came to 2,750 and this year it has reached 2,940. Elementary schools have shown the largest increase with a total of 1,844 as compared to last year's 1,571.

Dr. Stanley A. Cain and Dr. Curtis L. Newcombe of the Cranbrook Institute of Science are addressing the centennial celebration of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in Washington, September 15-17. 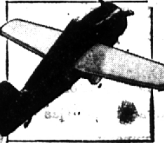
