## Knit Sweaters Lead 1963 Fashion Parade

The colorful assortment of sweaters for fall 1963 is bound to add to the swelling ranks of men who will find themselves the proud possessors of new sweater "collections."

The new knits have a three-fold appeal. These include both pullovers and cardigans as well as sleeveless sweater-vests.

Take the pullovers, for instance. These are made with crew-necks, V-necks, turtle-necks and some very new deep V-necks with a slightly rounded effect.

AS FAR AS the cardigans are concerned, the most wanted for the coming season will be the classic seven-button model. The newest cardigan on the scene is a high-closure eight-button style.

The texture of the new knits tell an important fashion story. As a matter of fact there are so many that they can be best described by such key words as fleecy, fluffy, lofty, brushed, bantam-weight, bulky (back in a big way), medium-weight; miniature shaker, cable (borrowed from the classic tennis sweater); "popcorn" and big-stitch.

Multiply those knits by the various yarns such as wool, wool blended with man-made fibers, all-man-made yarns, alpaca's, cashmeres, shetlands and fine-spuns as well as natural, specky "fisherman" yarns for a more comprehensive view of the wide choices.

BOTH PATTERNS and plains share the fashion honors this season. If patterns are your choice, you can have them two ways. First there are the clearly defined motifs in both bright and subdued shades. Then there are the "soft patterns" that are toned down by virtue of their soft brushed yarns.

The same applies to colors, wear them bright or wear them softly blended — you can't go wrong this year. There is a whole new batch of reds ready for this fall. Included are oxblood, cranberry and burgundy.

A sweater-like gadget worthy of note is the turtle-neck "dicky." This is a little pullover with front and back "bibs" to be worn as a warmer under another sweater or sport shirt. Another turtle-neck novelty is the convertible sweater collar that zips down into a roll-collar.

And, if all of the foregoing are

not enough, just take a look at those knits combined with suede fronts. These are made in both dressy and country styles, cardigans and pullovers. Teen men will go for their favorite knits embellished with suede elbow patches, too.
