Variety Spices Men's Autumn Sports Wear

It is easy to discuss the many new styles in sports outerwear this fall, but it's tough on the men who intend to buy only one or two of those garments. According to local merchants, the problem this season is not so much finding the wanted outerwear style, but deciding how many different types to get, with money and taste as the arbiters. One of the hot new categories this fall is suede. Take your pick of these softly napped leathers in short, mid and full-lengths. Select from all-suede or part-suede coats. Decide on which of the many new suede shades are the ones you like best. Don't worry about getting them spotted or rain stained. The new brushed leathers are protected by scientific finishes that make them soil, spot and water-resistant. IT ALSO means that now the men who merely skid on icy pavements are as strong for ski styles as the devotees of the

snowy slopes. The ski influence continues to build in the styling of outerwear. As each season goes by the ski motif becomes more authentic in both design and construction. Parkas, of course, are the leading ski-type outerwear garments and the newest are in all the authentic lengths and are built closer to the body to do away with excess bulk. Racer or stretch parkas debut in elasticized cloths that mold to the body, yet give with every movement of the arms and torso. OVER-THE-SEAT-length quilted parkas, the kind worn by the pros, renew their last season's popularity, this time with full belts. A whole new category of half-way-lengths, some in the parka style, others in jacket-types, further enhance the cold-weather selections. These come in both button and zipper fronts and their length is about 32 inches.

Long 38 and 40-inch coats, a favorite for campus and stadium wear, are back in many fabrics, too. Then there are convertible coats with pile collars and liners both of which zip off for mild days. DRESSY SPORTS outerwear coats round out the picture in a wide selection of wools, including the popular herringbones and silvery sharkskins. In both single and double-breasted styles, many of the dressy coats carry fur or fur-like collars in the shawl and notched styles. Some of these take their style cues from the smart short warmers of British army origin. Others look similar to tweed sport jackets. Look for corduroys, camel hairs, lodens, poplins and gabardines. It will certainly take a lot of looking before you decide on your favorites.

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
