# Formal Season Never Comes to Complete Halt

There was a time, prior to World War II, when the "formal scason" got underway at the late October opening of the National Horse Show in New York. Now, according to society editors across the country, it never comes to a halt.

Formal festivities calling for at least the nominal "black tie" cover the four seasons now, the only difference being the shift from summer formal wear (which, strictly speaking, is actually semi-formal wear) to the dressier darks, of fall and winter. Of course, the use of the ultra-formal white tie and tails is usually reserved for the late fall except in the case of earlier formal evening weddings.

HOW DOES one determine when to wear a black tie (tuxedo) or a white tie (evening tailcoat)? In the old days the decision was simple: If ladies were present at a formal evening, the white tie was mandatory. The black tie was considered correct for stag events only.

However, during and after World War I, the rules were let down and, with increasing frequency, hostesses specified black tie in their invitations. That is the way it has remained.
