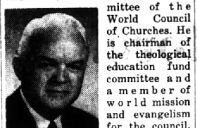

Dr. Harris to Mark 25 Years in B'ham

Members of First Presbyterian Church of Birmingham will honor their minister, Dr. W. Glen Harris, at a reception Sunday observing his 25th anniversary as pastor.

The guest speaker Sunday will be Dr. John Coventry Smith, of New York, general secretary of the Presbyterian Commission on Ecumenical Mission and Relations and a member of the central committee of the World Council of Churches. He is chairman of the theological education fund committee and a member of world mission and evangelism for the council.

Dr. Harris is a director of the North American Area of the World Presbyterian Alliance. For 12 years he has been a member of the commission on ecumenical mission and relations of the national church. He has been moderator of the New Brunswick, N.J., and Detroit presbyteries and vice-moderator of the Synod of Michigan.

DR. HARRIS is a director of Maryville College, Maryville, Tenn., and McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago.

Dr. and Mrs. Harris celebrated their 30th wedding anniversary last year. They have a daughter, two sons and two granddaughters.

Festive music sung by 450 chorists, accompanied by organ and trumpeters from the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, will add to the anniversary services.

Massed youth choirs of 175 youngsters will sing the anthem "O Sing Unto the Lord" by Wyrick, and the 70-voice adult Chancel Choir will present Vaughn-Williams' setting of the doxology assisted by trumpets. There will be an organ and trumpet prelude.

AFTER obtaining a bachelor's degree at Trinity University, San Antonio, he received bachelor and master of theology degrees at Princeton. He earned a master of arts degree at the University of Pennsylvania and his doctor of philosophy degree there in 1941.

Dr. Harris was ordained a Presbyterian minister in 1929 and was pastor of churches in West Trenton and Slackwood, N.J., for eight years before coming to Birmingham in 1938.

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Speaker Tells Of Project in Urban Schools

Dr. Carl Marburger, director of the Great Cities School Project, will speak before the Episcopal Churchwomen of Christ Church Cranbrook Tuesday.

The project is a study of 15 cities in the U. S. to examine prevalent and future school problems. It is jointly sponsored in Detroit areas from a grant by the Ford Foundation and the Detroit Public School System.

Seven schools in the Detroit area, housing some 10,000 students, their parents and teachers, are being surveyed in an attempt to determine which students will be future failures and dropouts, and to develop a method of aid in preventing this.

A NATIVE Detroit, Dr. Marburger has earned a doctorate from Wayne State University in curriculum development and was formerly a teacher, assistant principal, and principal in the Detroit Schools System.

Following Dr. Marburger's address, the ECW will welcome back as their speaker for the afternoon, the Very Rev. Robert De Witt, suffragan bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Michigan.

Former rector of Christ Church, Bishop DeWitt served as rector of Wayne's Episcopal Cathedral prior to this and now serves as head of Episcopal Diocese in metropolitan Detroit.

A graduate of the Episcopal Theological Seminary in Cambridge, Mass., he holds honorary doctorates from Virginia Seminary and Amherst College.
