Hogan Announces Contributions to Holy Cross Fund

The Holy Cross College (Worcester, Mass.) Development Program has passed \$4 million with an anonymous gift of 50,000 dollars.

Henry M. Hogan, '18, national chairman of the campaign, announced that the total amount pledged to the Development Program is \$4,011,450.

Hogan, 444 Arlington, Birmingham, is retired vice president and general counsel of the General Motors Corp.

He said that the amount represents 2,033 pledges to date, with more than a million and one quarter dollars already paid in cash.

OF THE more than four million dollars pledged, he noted that 80 per cent of the money has come from Holy Cross alumni and approximately one quarter of a million dollars from Worcester corporations.

The Holy Cross Development Program, launched one year ago, has a long-range goal of \$20.4 million, with an initial goal of \$7.5 million to be met next summer.

The first phase, the Alumni Memorial Phase, is concerned principally with key leadership gifts from alumni. Boston attorney Edward B. Hanify, '33, is chairman of the Alumni Memorial Committee.

Pontiac Hospital Income at Record Level for Period

Pontiac General Hospital reported its greatest excess of income over expenses this year during the accounting period from Aug. 11 to Sept. 7.

Hospital Administrator Harold B. Euler said the excess was \$19,230. For the year so far income has topped expenses by \$52,093 compared with \$47,800 for the same period of last year.

EULER ALSO said that occupancy of hospital beds was running 98 per cent in the week that began Sept. 8. He said the high rate was putting pressure on the admissions staff.

During the week 62 scheduled admissions and to be cancelled because no beds were available, he said.

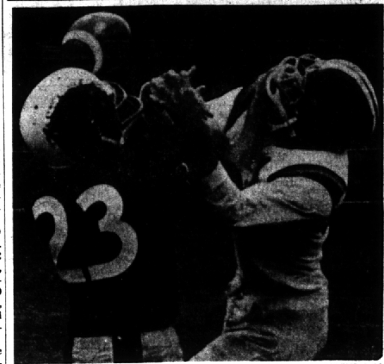
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Nope, It's Not in There!
