One of the more difficult problems in bridge is to decide when to sacrifice and when to double. This was the place that Arlene and Burnett Heck found themselves in our hand for today.

If there was an exact foolproof answer, I would have found it and given you this answer, but Arlene and Burnett found the answer for this hand.

EAST AND WEST VULNERABLE Dealer: East.

The bidding:
East South West North
1 ♠ 1 ♥ 1 ♠ 2 ♠
2 ♠ 3 ♥ pass pass
3 ♠ double all pass
Opening lead: K ♥

Arlene found herself in a position of a sacrifice of four hearts or double three spades. Many of the less experienced pairs feared to double the non-game bid of three spades and went down one or four hearts. However, Arlene did come to the right conclusion, based upon experienced bridge deductions, and found the correct bid. In the play of the hand, Arlene opened the king of hearts and switched to the seven of clubs. With this defense, they were able to win two clubs, one heart, one diamond and one spade, for 500 points and the top board. The best north and south can do is three hearts for 140 points.

WE FIND THAT most all bridge tournaments lag during the holiday season, and therefore no major ones are scheduled. Mrs. Maybaum and myself hope that you and yours enjoyed a wonderful holiday season in the best of health and that you are again ready for the battles of bridge.

Liberman went to New York in 1941 where he joined the staff of Vogue magazine. In 1948 he was appointed art director of Vogue and later of all Condé Nast publications in the United States and Europe.

SEVERAL OF HIS photographs are in the collection of the museum of Modern Art, and his first one-man show of paintings was held at the Betty Parsons Gallery in New York in 1960.

Alexander Liberman has documented the lives and working habits of the most famous artists of the time in book form, entitled "The Artist in his Studio," which gives an intimate insight into the lives and works of 39 modern masters, all associated with the School of Paris.

This exhibition will hang through Jan. 23 and is open daily except Mondays from 2 to 5 p.m.

I did attend this tournament last year and can assure you that they are wonderful hosts at the gateway to the South.

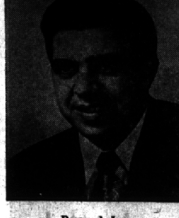
My plans are to attend this one and report it to you, the readers. Two weeks later will be the regional tournament in Chicago. This is also a "must."

A program entitled "In Operetta Time," will be sung by Bernard Izzo, baritone, and Dorothy Cochran, soprano. David Burk is accompanist and piano soloist.

The pair will sing duets from opera, oratorio, musical comedy and light opera and will also offer solo groups.

Dorothy Cochran, a native of New York, graduated from Cornell University and studied singing in New York and Chicago where she now lives. She is married and has three small children.

She has sung in many European cities and the major cities of the United States. She toured with USO camp shows for soldiers in Europe.

Lyric Opera of Chicago, each season sings in at least 20 states and Canada.

He gives recitals and sings in oratorios with symphony orchestras. He has broadcast more than 300 TV and radio programs.
