AT THE N.Y. FAIR

"Walk the World" In Ford's Exhibit

Imagine a vacation trip through 11 different lands, with the chance of a lifetime to study famous landmarks, local history and legends. This is the experience—simulated, but retaining considerable authenticity—awaiting visitors to the Ford Motor Company Pavilion at the New York World's Fair of 1964-65.

Spreading before visitors as they enter the Rotunda portion of the Ford Pavilion will be a fanciful, Walt Disney-designed attraction called Ford's International Gardens.

Done in miniature (one-half inch to the foot), the "gardens" will offer feigners an absorbing tour of Colonial America, Merrie England, Medieval Europe and the Far East.

HISTORY AND LEGEND will walk hand-in-hand in the International Gardens. For example, one "island" 30 feet across, authentic reproductions of buildings from five major periods of French architecture—from the Roman invasion to the Republic—look eastward across the Rhine to the castles of Germany. Jutting up on the river bank is the "Mouse Tower of the Rhine," where, legend has it, a cruel cleric of the Ninth Century was devoured by an army of mice.

In Colonial America, visitors will see the Hasbrouck House of Newburgh, N. Y., where General Washington once made his headquarters, the Dutch Reformed Church near North Tarryton, N. Y., of "Sleepy Hollow" fame, and many other reminders of America's past.

From the Aztec temples and conquerors' homes of old Mexico to the penal colonies of Australia, from the fishing villages of Malaya to the desert outposts of North Africa and the ruins of Ancient Rome, from the quaint churches of French Canada to the farmyards of Denmark—the International Gardens will illustrate the traditions of nations where Ford products are made or sold.

THE AUTHENTICITY of this portion of the Ford exhibit is due to months of diligent research by the staff of Disney's WED Enterprises, Inc., of Glendale, Calif. A

individual plans and painted full-color sketches. These, plus photographs of actual landmarks and buildings to be reproduced, went to model makers at Display & Exhibit Company in Detroit. Here, skilled craftsmen set about the meticulous task of rebuilding, by hand, the landmarks of the ages and duplicating the architecture in miniature.

In the garden construction process, the craftsmen are laying half a million tiny "bricks" (cut from vinyl tile) on the streets of Europe. Cobblestones and castle steps were formed from alabaster quarried in northern Michigan.

More than 900,000 miniature shingles were formed from polyester plastic. Tiny panes for stained glass windows were colored through the action of alcohol on clear polyester. Delicate filigree for 19th Century Austrian homes was etched on brass with hand-drawn patterns.

OVER 350,000 two-foot lengths of wire were used to form tree branches and twigs. Hedges were cut from rubber upholstery padding. Remarkably realistic grass "sprouted" when velvet cloth was brushed in a special manner with green paint and glue.

Autumn brightened French Canada when leaves formed of crushed mica were sprayed with fluorescent paint. Plaster aprons ripened in the orchards of early America.

Tom Thumb-like people (were carved from white oak by one of the model makers, an ex-circus clown named Jean LeRoy, whose hobby of whittling miniature circus figures led him into his present profession.

From Detroit, the little countries for the Ford International Gardens will be trucked in sections to the New York World's Fair site.
