Guest artist Frano Jellincic selected the following members as the performing company:

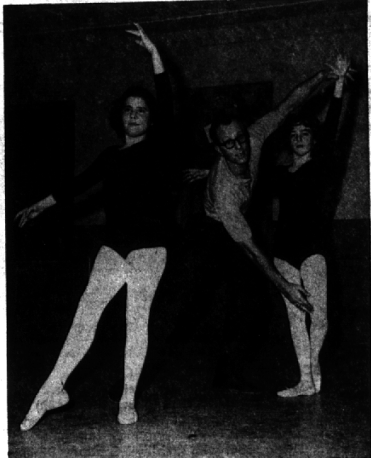

So if you were on one of the snob lists that were mailed the livid brochures, rest assured you will receive no more.

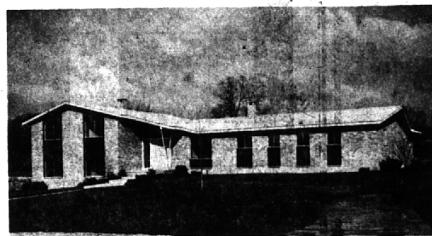
ONE OF OUR home town residents will be the artist in the "Dinner with the Artist" evening slated Tuesday by Detroit Adventure.

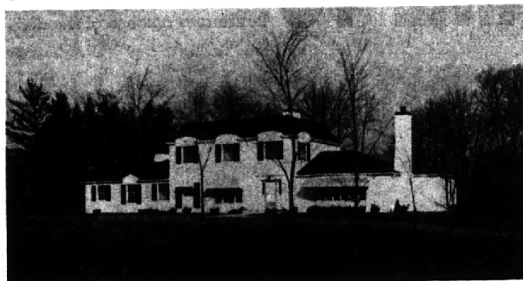

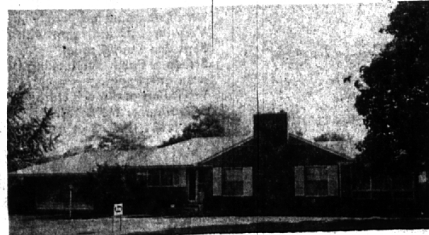
