## Br. Rice Upsets ND; Maples Edged

Brother Rice threw the Catholic League's Central Division basketball race into a scramble Friday night by defeating previously unbeaten Notre Dame High, 50-46.

The Warriors, in their first season of competition in the league, found themselves in a tie for the lead after knocking off the high-flying Harper Woods school.

Brother Rice smothered the Notre Dame attack with his height. Terry Finn, a 6-foot-5 sophomore, held the Irish's Randy Lamprides to just eight points.

PAUL JAGELS led the Warrior offense with 21 points. Center Bill Moore chipped in 10. Brother Rice played Detroit Cathedral Tuesday and faces Salstein Friday.

The win upped the season mark for the Warriors to 4-1. Coach Ken

Yastie's crew had a 21-18 advantage on field goals and a 84-49 edge in rebounding as the taller Rice quintet used height to the best of its advantage.

Jagels canned 14 of his 21 points in the first half to supply a needed scoring push. Rice led 16-14 at the end of the first quarter and 33-27 at half. The Warriors were never behind after the first period and took a 40-35 lead into the final stanza.

RICE LOOKED like somewhat of a dream team for moments in the first half as excellent rebounding and play kept them in front.

But, they managed only 17 points in the second half. Notre Dame, unable to capitalize, hit for only 16, and never caught the winners.

Jagels, a high-scoring guard, saved the day on defense, too. He intercepted two ND passes in the final 35 seconds of play.

RICE, A 9-6 team last year, now must be rated a top contender for the league crown.

### Falcons Dunk Foe; Seaholm Tankers Win

Seaholm and Groves tanked away to record their most victories last weekend, the Maples outscoring Ann Arbor, 58-47, while the Falcons took the measure of Hazel Park, 72-35.

Groves had no trouble disposing of their opponent Friday night. The Falcons swept 11 Clarkson, a double in the 200 and 400-yard freestyles. The only event Groves lost was the 100-freestyle.

Times were slow, but the Falcons were not pushed in the meet, as they registered their third victory in four meets.

SEAHOLM, STILL the class of Michigan, was mightily thanked that Pete Adams transferred from Detroit Pershing.

The defending state champ in the 200 and 400 freestyles led the Maples in their triumph over always-tough Ann Arbor.

Adams set a pool record of 4:38.4 in the 400. The Seaholm 200-yard freestyle relay team set another pool record as they won (See FALCONS, 5-E)

### Hills Skate Star Wins Title

Tim Wood, the 15-year-old Detroit Skating Club star from Bloomfield Hills, turned in a magnificent free skating exhibition to win the senior men's singles of the Midwest figure skating championships at Cobo Arena Saturday night.

The son of Dr. and Mrs. Kenneth Wood, 4833 Myflower Court, held a slight edge over his nearest rival, Bob Kaden of Minneapolis, after the compulsory figures Friday, and opened an even greater margin Saturday.

JUDGES AWARDED him four first places and one third place in the final tabulation after the free skating competition. Wood outdistanced the field, 123.24 to second-place finisher Duane Maki's 123.86.

It was the second straight senior men's crown for the Bloomfield Hills skater. Tim won the National novice men's title in 1962.

A crowd of nearly 3,000 loudly applauded Wood's brilliant free skating exhibition. His moves were effortless as he achieved great height in his double-twisting jumps and spins.

TIM, ALONG with teammate Yvonne Drummond, will now compete in the National Figure Skating Championships at Cleveland, Friday through Sunday.

Wood won the senior division in the Midwest regionals but will be competing for a junior title in the Nationals since all qualifiers drop down a class.

Tim is rated an excellent chance to qualify in the Nationals next weekend for the U. S. Olympic team for the Winter Games at Innsbruck, Austria, Jan. 29-Feb. 9.

GROVES WAS never in the game. The Bears opened a 22-10 first period lead, widened it to 36-20 at halftime and then added 60 points in the final half compared to the Falcons' 26.

Groves ran up against a frustrated Berkeley basketball team Friday night and the results were disastrous for the Falcons.

THE SHOW will be the largest of its kind to be presented in Detroit's waterfront convention center.

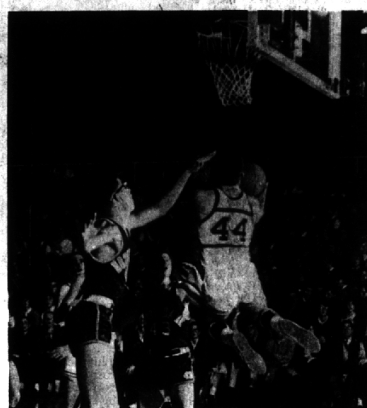

### Hazel Park 59-58 Winner

The Eastern Michigan League Basketball title isn't decided yet, by a long shot. But what has happened in just a few short weeks has raised a few eyebrows.

Seaholm, a strong contender, and Ferndale, the pre-season choice and defending state champ, are mired in fourth place with identical 2-2 records.

The Maples accomplished this with a 59-58 loss to surprisingly strong Hazel Park Friday. The Parkers, undefeated in four starts, sit atop the EML with Kimball, 74-65, conquerors of Ferndale, nestled in second place at 2-1.

SEAHOLM LOST a thriller to Hazel Park after closing the gap to just one point. "We had an awful lead-in in the second period—that really hurt," Maple coach Lew Parry said.

Hazel Park guard Jim Boreland was the hero for the Parkers. He tossed in 17 points and added two free throws and a layup in the last two minutes that proved the difference.

The Parkers stalled in the final minutes with a five-point lead, but Seaholm's Ron Jacobson stole the ball and narrowed the gap to 59-56 with a bucket.

With 51 seconds to go, Maple Tom Snyder cannot a pair of free throws to make it 59-58. Hazel Park's Vern Hill and Boreland missed on free throw attempts and in the final seconds, Snyder missed on an attempt for a driving layup.

BOTH CLUBS were hot at the line. Seaholm hit on 20 of 28 while HP had 15 of 21. HP led after the first quarter, 12-11, and at half, 28-27. Both teams scored 31 points in the final half.

Hazel Park shot to an eventual winning cushion in the second half when they opened up a 43-28 lead early in the third period. Seaholm meets Roseville Friday.

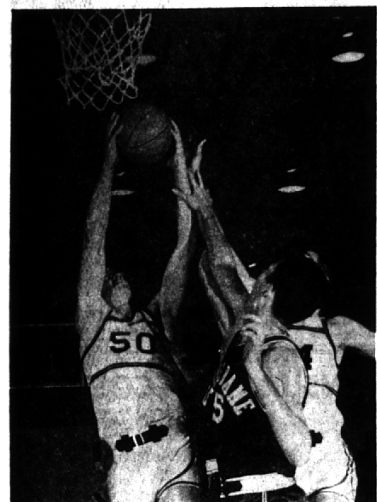
### North Macomb Sportsmen's Club Receives Award

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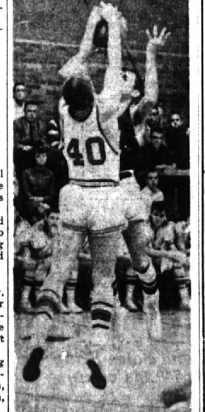
