Basketball Main Attraction For Brother Rice Students

Basketball, with a capital B, is the dominant activity at Brother Rice High School. With the Warriors in major contention for the championship of the Catholic Central Division, school interest and spirit has focused on Coach Ken Yastik's team. The Brother Rice team had a 5-1 won-loss record going into their game with Salesian High School.

The Warriors opened the season with a 54-63 loss to the Shamrocks of Catholic Central. Recovering from their only defeat, the Brother Rice five handily defeated

De La Salle 66-51, and Austin 69-66.

Triumphing over the University of Detroit High School Cubs, in the final seconds of the game, the BHRS team and student body gained revenge for last year's un-uncertainty of football season.

THIS 55-53 victory over U of D and a 50-40 humbling of Notre Dame placed Brother Rice in a four-way tie for the league lead. A 58-50 decision over Detroit Cathedral insured Brother Rice of temporary first place.

Although basketball holds the BHRS spotlight, other activities have and will take place at Broth-

er Rice. The Dance Committee sponsored two dances during the Christmas vacation.

The joint Marian-Brother Rice Student Council dance held on Dec. 23 was a success, as was the Brother Rice senior dance "Let's Move in '64." This dance was held on Jan. 4.
