

Recreational Activities Offered To Bloomfield High Students

Several recreational activities for high school students have been added to the program which the Bloomfield Hills School System recreation department offers.

Courses in dog obedience, fencing, gymnastics, conversational German, knitting, modern dance, trampoline and tennis will be available for BHHS students and high school students of the Bloomfield area beginning Jan. 27.

The courses will be held at the high school after school and Saturdays for eight to 12 weeks.

ART INSTRUCTOR Donald Dennis, who traveled through Europe and the Orient for six months in 1963, presented movies and commentaries of his trip to students during class assemblies Jan. 7, 8 and 9. He showed movies of his visits to the Middle East, India and Japan.

Dennis and his wife, Margaret, will present discussions of their trip for adults Wednesday evenings at the high school in connection with the recreation department program.

Senior members of the Future Teachers Club visited Wayne State University Jan. 9 to observe teaching techniques employed in the classroom. Miss Deanna Maher, sponsor of the group, accompanied the 12 students to the University. Later this month, Mrs. Kathleen Flint, Assistant Superintendent of Instruction of the Bloomfield Hills School System, will address the club concerning elementary school teaching.

MONSIEUR JEAN BARD and his wife, Madame Iris Avichay, world known French actors, performed for the French Club and French students from four local schools.

Without the use of props or costumes, the couple offered a variety of interpretive readings, selections from plays and poetry.

Monsieur Bard attended L'Academie Francaise. He worked in the French theater before he and his wife began making appearances in Canada and the United States.

Four local schools attended this performance including Kingswood, Seaholm, Walled Lake High Schools and the University of Detroit.

CLARENCE Luchman, BHHS music instructor, will attend the Midwestern Conference on School Vocal and Instrumental Music Friday and Saturday at the University of Michigan.

The conference, which is sponsored by several Michigan music organizations, brings together Midwestern music instructors and noted conductors and speakers. Discussions, exhibits, lectures and music workshops will be presented during the Conference.

FEBRUARY 14, 15 Marian Prepares For Drama Festival

Auditions were held the week of Jan. 6 for the second annual drama festival, "Festival '64," scheduled for Feb. 14 and 15. The weekend will include dramatic monologues, interpretive reading and folk singing, as well as a recital of modern dance.

Two complete plays will demonstrate different aspects of the history of drama. "Antigone," the final tragic member of Sophocles' "Oedipus Trilogy," written in ancient Greece, will be contrasted by the modern version of another tragedy, "The Trial of Jeanne d'Arc."

"Festival '64" is under the direction of Miss Nancy Esaler, head of the drama department, and Sister M. Judine. Stage settings for "Antigone" will be provided by one of the freshman English classes under the direction of Miss McCaffrey and Miss Shukait.

SCHOOL SESSIONS were recessed Friday afternoon so that a faculty-council workshop could take place. Officers and representatives of the Student Council and Student Spiritual Council participated in this concentrated follow-up to the all-school Open Assembly of Nov. 28.

Patterned after a town meeting, the assembly was meant to insure that at Marian, the late President Kennedy's death had not been in vain.

Questions discussed at the assembly and at the subsequent workshop included the need of specific action, the status of school unity and the function of the student councils in regard to personal loyalty and individual and group leadership.

FRESHMAN GLOBAL history classes have been studying international cooperation as well as conflicting ideologies in the world today. The play "The Larger Freedom" on UNESCO was directed by Elaine Hallett under Sister Kenneth Marie. Students who participated were Patricia Glynn, Mary Ellen Mareski and Debbie Nolan.

Carol Genetti, Anne O'Brien and Marie Savage acted as personifications of spirits of an age, while Kathleen Kolas and Sharon O'Connor presented graphic and humorous presentations of Ivan the Terrible and Peter the Great. Linking all together were bulletin boards. Susan Alkare, Anne Ruessman and Maureen Stanford prepared a display on "Russian

People Today" and Joan Magee and Mary Ellen Moreski worked together on the current display of world history.

Several individual projects were selected for corridor display. K. Klebs' display was a research paper on the history, theory, tactics and human element connected with Communism and the Soviet Union.

Karen McKenna's work was a product and national region map of the United States. She prepared economic graphs and a chart of comparative government between the U.S.A. and the U.S.S.R.

A SECOND display in the student lounge has been prepared by senior members of Sister M. Hermen's religion classes. Each student has finished part one of a continuous file of Family Liturgical Customs connected with the church year.

Members of the Library Club, under Sister M. Maurzen, conducted the pin ceremony Jan. 9. Student librarians have been constructing displays, promoted cultural activities and conducted fund-raising activities.


