## BRIDGE in BIRMINGHAM

During the holiday season, most duplicate bridge came to a standstill as all Birmingham tournaments closed down. However, on New Year's Eve, there was a private party I attended, as did many others from the Birmingham area, and from this party came today's hand.

Dr. Harold Barron of this area, playing the south hand, arrived at a different contract and found that he could convince East he was being squeezed. Here is how this pseudo-squeeze play worked.

Neither Vulnerable: Dealer: North

The Bidding: North East South West pass 1 ♠ double pass 1 ♥ pass 2 NT all pass 3 NT Opening Lead: 6 ♠ Most north and south pairs arrived at a four-heart contract and lost two club tricks—a club ruff and a trump trick for down one. However, in no-trumps, there are 10 tricks off the top and this pseudo-squeeze on the east hand.

The opening lead was won with the king of clubs, and the troy of spades was returned. Dr. Barron played the queen of spades, and when this held, he then forced out the ace of clubs.

East, not wishing to be end-played, took the club trick at once and returned a club. Doc now exhausted the diamond suit and discarded the four of spades on the fourth diamond. East decided if he discarded a heart that the suit would set up and did discard a spade. Dr. Barron was now able to count the hand down and catch the unexpected king of spades for five no-trumps and the top board.

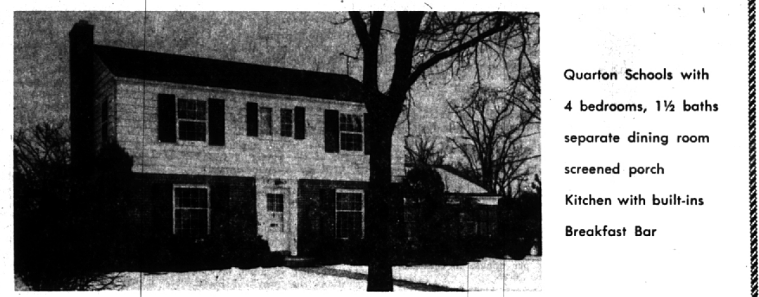

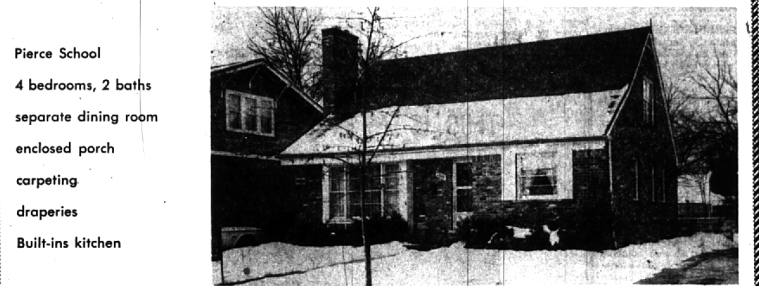

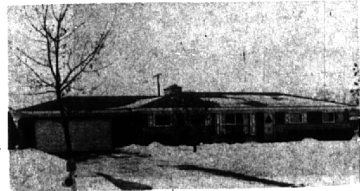
