ENLISTING IN the U.S. Marine Corps as a private in October, 1942, he was discharged with the rank of second lieutenant as an infantry officer on Dec. 7, 1945. Kenning is active in the Faith Baptist Church, Royal Oak; International City Managers Association; American Society of Civil Engineers; American Society for Personnel Administrators; National Congress of Parents and Teachers; Rotary International, serving as president of the Birmingham Rotary Club in 1962-63; Boy Scouts of America, presently as assistant cub master; and the Birmingham YMCA.

HE HAS BEEN assistant city manager since Sept. 15, 1966. He came to the city as assistant superintendent of the Department of Public Works on Oct. 1, 1961, and then served as superintendent from Feb. 28, 1963, until assuming his present post.

Merchant Claims Traffic Rules Causing Losses

A complaint by a merchant that traffic regulations at the corner of Lincoln and Woodward are hurting his business was referred to the administration for study by Birmingham city commissioners Monday night.

S. C. Avesian, owner of Colonial Cleaners, 1124 S. Woodward, told commissioners that with the present set of traffic regulations it was "extremely difficult, if not impossible, to gain access" to his business from Woodward Avenue.

REGULATIONS REQUIRE that traffic driving south on Woodward at Lincoln must either turn right on Lincoln from the right hand lane, or continue south of Woodward if they are in the left hand lane.

The cleaners is located in the first block south of Lincoln on Woodward.

Avesian said that access to his store is limited to a service drive located almost on the southwest corner of the intersection.

As a result of the traffic control he said he had experienced "a considerable loss of business."

Assistant City Manager Robert S. Kenning told commissioners the engineering and police departments are investigating traffic control at the Woodward-Lincoln intersection and several others in the city and would be bringing in a report in four to six weeks.

Main said he felt it wasn't quite right to have the assessor sitting in judgment of his own decisions.

THE REPLACING of the assessor on the board would require a charter amendment.

Commissioner Charles A. Renfrew said he thought the present system was a good one and believed it would be "a mistake to change a winning ball club."

Any proposal for a charter amendment would have to be brought before the commission by Feb. 3, according to Mayor William H. Burgum.
