## Student Mechanic Program Recharged With Help of GM

Automotive service education was given a welcomed boost recently from General Motors Corp. when Louis C. Goad, GM executive vice president in charge of staff activities, presented car parts and special tools to Ecorse High School, Goad, of 271 Lone Pine Road, Bloomfield Hills, initiated the program that will provide modern automotive components and special tools to aid in the training of me-

chanics.

THE PRESENTATION was made at the opening of the school's enlarged auto shop classroom, which now is capable of training 100 students a semester in the most modern techniques of auto mechanics.

Included in the gift were two modern V-8 engines, a Hydra-Matic transmission and a rear axle as-

sembly, plus engine stands, transmission holding fixtures and special tools such as are used by mechanics in GM dealers' service repair shops.

The new GM program is a part of their total program of support to education, which, in recent years, has amounted to more than \$9 million annually.

UNDER THE new program, high schools, vocational schools and schools of higher education with mechanics and automotive engineering classes which can qualify for needed equipment will be supplied with the latest automotive components and equipment necessary to give proper instructions in automotive service techniques.

"For the past few years we have been offering summer training to high school and vocational school teachers whose interests are in auto mechanics. This new program of aid to high schools and vocational training schools through gifts of automotive components and special tools should increase the skill and knowledge of those students who seek to become proficient in automotive service repair," Goad said.

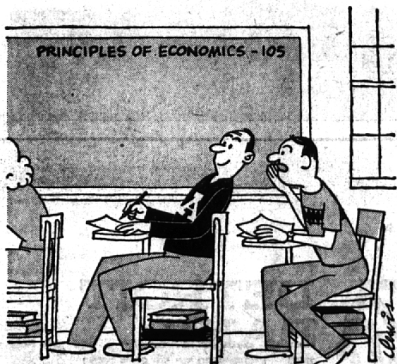
The nine-week training includes naval orientation, history and organization, seamanship, ordnance and gunnery, military drill, first aid and survival.

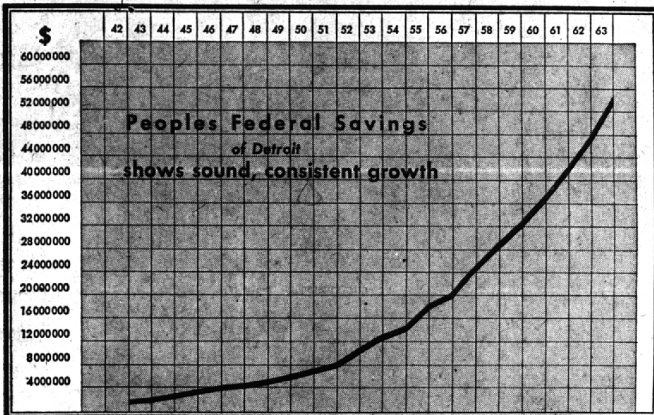
