ON JAN. 11, two Marian sophomores demonstrated their genetic recombination experiment to a council of Biological Science Curriculum Study (BSCS) teachers at Immaculata High School.

Judy Fehr and Alberta Savonuzzi used the mold *Sordaria fimicola* in their demonstration before 55 teachers from public and parochial schools of Michigan and Ohio.

The accelerated math program, which started in 1958, has grown from 18 students in that year to 63 in 1964.

In the 7th grade the advanced student covers 7th and 8th grade arithmetic; in 8th grade he takes Algebra I; and in 9th Grade Algebra II. If this program is continued through senior high school, the student may advance through calculus in the senior year.

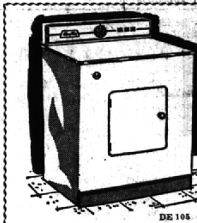
