Bernard Maslanic, coordinator of special services in Birmingham schools, and Mrs. Dorothy Smith, a visiting nurse in Birmingham schools, shared the spotlight at the Torry PTA meeting Jan. 14 in the school gym.

During a round table discussion concerning a child's social and academic adjustment in the fourth, fifth and sixth grades, Maslanic explained that it is evident to psychologists in social work that the fourth grade is a crucial time in a child's life.

"A child may get along fine in the lower elementary grades, and then fall academically and socially in the upper elementary grades," Maslanic said.

MRS. SMITH explained in her experiences in child guidance clinics and as a social worker in Birmingham schools that most of the children with whom she works are ten years old, and there are

two and one half times more boys than girls.

Mrs. Smith said that usually the teacher notices symptoms of serious emotional and mental disturbances in a child. When Mrs. Smith is asked to help, she works with the child and the parents to try to discover what is troubling the child.

Maslanic said that through a complicated testing program, he has discovered many times that a non-achiever is a bright child, but he cannot do his best because he has emotional problems and no amount of tutoring can make a child progress academically if he is angry, worried and unhappy.
