Michigan's ski centers have been swarming with novices since the beginning of the snow season, but Saturday marked the start of the competitive events that are features of the state's winter sports program.

The Michigan Tourist Council lists 33 meets at state ski areas from mid-January through the end of March. Slalom, downhill, cross-country and jumping tournaments are scheduled at many of Michigan's 85 ski areas.

DOWNHILL AND SLALOM races are referred to as "alpine" events as they are run over prescribed courses on slopes, as opposed to "nordic" events that are cross-country races generally run over courses 15, 20 or 30 kilometers.

For the downhill racer, one objective is to get to the bottom of the most direct and fastest route. Form is important only to the extent that it influences speed.

Slalom racing places a premium on agility and timing as contestants run a downhill course that winds between "gates" positioned on the rear most negotiate between them to complete the downhill run.

The "nordic" cross-country events require stamina. Skiers use long, narrow "running" skis and flexible boots that allow for the most gliding strides to cover level-ground stretches on the course.

The show runs through Feb. 9.

Local Car Among 60 In International Show

Sports cars from more than a century of automotive history—including a 1928 steam carriage and two dozen 1964 touring and racing cars—are currently on display at the Henry Ford Museum through Feb. 9.

The 12th annual "Sports Cars in Review" show, this year featuring 60 cars from eight nations, has a local note to it.

One of the international beauties is owned by William G. Wyckoff, Beverly Hills. Wyckoff, a sports car buff since 1950, is the proud owner of a 1950 red Cisitalia, an Italian convertible.

HE HAS PUT three years in the restoration of the car. The 1950 Cisitalia was a production sports car designed by Romeo Dante and set a new standard for its day. The 202 convertible had a modified 1100 Fiat engine, delivering 103.1 horsepower per cubic inch of displacement.

It was set into a lightweight steel-tube frame of aircraft type and surrounded by a Plain Parina aluminum body with minimum wind resistance.

Low weight, combined with low drag and a high-performance engine, produced spectacular results. The whole car has been called a masterpiece of industrial design.

WYCKOFF'S CAR has a four-speed transmission, a 94 1/2 inch wheelbase, weighs 1680 pounds and has a speed of 115 mph. Its maker was Automobili Cisitalia in Turin, Italy.

The sports car show will have view for the first time in this country. Great Britain's Sunbeam Alpine, Series IV, and Italy's Ferrari Super America, both 1964 models.

1964 cars making their Midwest premiere includes the Cortina GT, Datsun, Morgan 4, Triumph Spitfire and Volkswagen Formula V. Racing movies, lectures and a fashion show will also be featured.

A second example of solid team bowling was given by Chuck Olin's Birmingham Drug team as it split a 2-1 Torrence Oil. Bob Hoerstmann's 213 in 597, Don Docter's 206 in 590 and Larry Brown's 211, 204 in 588 paced Drug.

The talk of the league is Bob Drabik's Birmingham Bowl team. After a miserable early season slump during which they lost 23 points in a row, Bowl suffered no hot streak which has carried them within four points of first place. Leader of the streak is Dave Cashman. One of the league's top bowlers last season, Cashman is rounding into his old form after a slow start. His 224 in 586 led Bowl to a three point victory over Donar's.

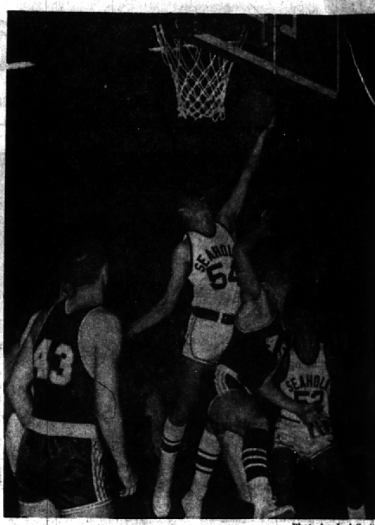
Country Day Nipped, 52-42
