million in damages in a libel suit against The Saturday Evening Post. The damages were later reduced to \$460,000.

E. ROSS HANSON, school board president, said after the meeting he felt it was "inappropriate to comment at this time" on Kelley's remarks.

Kelley told the board TAE had done everything it could to preserve the values it believes it has.

"We are unable to find anything that warrants the abandonment of activities," Kelley said.

Trustee Peil Hollingshead, speaking for the board, said the schools have nothing against TAE itself.

"Our only concern is with respect to members of the organization who are public school students," he said.

"It can continue to operate as a corporation and have members who are nonpublic school students as far as the board is concerned."

THE PURPOSE of TAE, according to its by-laws, is:

"To engage in charitable work on behalf of the needy, underprivileged and the ill, particularly children, through monetary contributions and personal service of the members of the corporation and provisional members acting under the direction and control of the board of directors."

Kelley asked Hollingshead, if a citizen could get information and advice on building a home from authorities, why could the school board not advise TAE what to do to become legal?

"We have no authority to advise in this matter," Hollingshead answered.

HOLLINGSHEAD said that he believed TAE and the board had reached a point where their disagreements were "unreconcilable," and there was no point in going over the matter.

Several times during the evening the discussion was interrupted by shouts from angry mothers of TAE members in the audience.

In announcing his daughter's active membership in the organization, Kelley said he was "not going to be intimidated by a public authority."

He called the board's implication that Nancy's credits might be withheld "a threat."

"It's a threat in my book and always will be a threat," he said.
