**Home Rule**

AFTER MORE than 50 years of home rule, 186 of Michigan's 219 cities and 51 of its villages have incorporated or reincorporated with home rule charters. The 186 cities have charters drafted by locally elected charter commissions and adopted by local referendums. Only 33 cities have not yet exercised their home rule power and continue to try new forms of government to meet the accompanying problems.

The impact of home rule on local government has been extensive, partly because of the particular acts at which it was introduced. Urbanization was developing fast and, because of home rule, Michigan municipalities were free to try new forms of government to meet the accompanying problems.

CITIES AND villages have found results of their home rule charters, as permitted by the enabling legislation, to be at least reasonably satisfactory with one exception—their taxing powers. This is a subject with which we will deal separately in this series.

Home rule for counties extends to counties the same rights of self-determination extended to municipalities in 1909. Needless to say, the very nature of county government is the fact that it encompasses all the local units within its boundaries and acts as an agency of the state, makes county home rule legislation more complicated to enact.

SIMPLY STATED, county home rule gives the people of the county the right to frame, adopt and amend a charter for their own government. In so doing, it authorizes the duly constituted government to make local decisions locally and to tailor state and national decisions, within the limitations imposed by law, to fit local needs.

A home rule charter serves as basic law, as the constitution of the county. The charter must be approved by the electorate and should it require revision or amendment at a later date, it may be amended in the same manner, by the majority of those voting on the question.

THE HOME rule charter, properly framed under the right kind of enabling legislation, frees the county to deal with purely local situations which are not covered by general law because of their specific nature. Under general law such a situation would be met with action or require a special act of the legislature.

There are as many kinds of county home rule as there are proponents of it. The principle, as it is usually understood and applied in other states, embodies three concepts. The three are not necessarily related or interdependent and the degree to which each or all has been granted differs widely.

THE THREE concepts are: (1) The power to revise the form of county government, (2) the authority to exercise powers independent of the legislature and (3) the power to merge with enveloped cities or neighboring counties.

any or all of the concepts are granted in Michigan. Any charter for any county in Michigan, from metropolitan Wayne to rural Shiawassee, must be drafted within the framework of the enabling statutes which will be passed by the state legislature.

IT WOULD seem that county home rule should logically include all of the attributes of municipal home rule, while avoiding conflict therewith, and add new considerations for the fact that the county acts as an agency of the state.

Over half of the county's activities stem from that fact. If we presuppose the need for maximum local self-determination in all things, we must extend it to cover, to some degree, the vast variety of functions performed by the county for the state.

Home rule has never been advocated—even by its most avid proponents—as a means to terminate state control over state matters. Home rule, then, is that structure of county government and that array of county services desired by the people of the county concerned. The point we must bear in mind is that a home rule charter does not automatically give modern county government.

In fact, those wishing to preserve the most archaic county government institutions could use home rule provisions to do that very thing!

This is why an informed electorate is so essential in the issue of county home rule. (Next: THE HISTORY OF HOME RULE IN MICHIGAN).

appointees and the 15 members previously appointed met this qualification. He added that he intended to appoint a long-time resident to head the committee.

THE FEE for a direct tap-in to a water main was raised from \$600 to \$700. The additional fee may be used to defray the cost of a special assessment district in which the property making the direct tap would normally have been included.

The board denied by a split vote a petition to rezone acreage on Square Lake Road east of Mulberry from residential to multiple dwelling. Its decision upheld a recommendation from the planning commission that the property remain zoned for single residences.

Swindell and Sam Reeve cast the opposing votes.

The bonds authorized by the board will finance water main construction in four areas in the township.

SALE OF the bonds in a block prompted Swindell to comment that he would like to see construction of water mains extend over larger assessment districts rather than smaller assessment districts.

"I believe we would get a better water system—better construction and possibly a saving in costs—by having contractors bid on larger jobs rather than several small jobs," he said.
