Keating said he hoped to move into the building by July 1. The temple association is going ahead with plans for the construction of a new temple at Woodward and Chesterfield in Bloomfield Hills. In addition to the real estate office, Keating said there was a possibility that part of the building would be rented out as office space.

### THE BUILDING, popularly known as the old Peabody home, has housed Birmingham Lodge No. 44 and other local Masonic organizations since 1923.

Keating said both the inside and outside of the building would be painted and he was thinking of changing the entrance way and restoring the outside of the structure.

## Peace Corpsman Destination Is Afghanistan

John Whipple Bing, son of Dr. Richard J. Bing of 3801 Carriage Road, Birmingham, has begun a two-year assignment as a Peace Corps volunteer in Afghanistan. He is one of 34 volunteers who left New York in January for Afghanistan to work in an education and public administration project. They join 32 other volunteers who have been serving there for a year or more as nurses, English teachers, printers and mechanics. The volunteers will assist the schools and ministries in carrying out self-improvement programs. More specifically, they will work as English teachers, secretaries, statisticians, postal clerks, telephone operators and warehouse managers. At the same time they will train Afghan personnel in these skills.

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
