Northminster Sponsors 'Great Decisions' Study

During the weeks of Feb. 9 through March 29, Northminster Presbyterian Church will sponsor "Great Decisions," a program of informal discussion groups concerning United States foreign policy.

This annual program is prepared nationally by the Foreign Policy Association, a nonpartisan, non-profit, educational agency. This year marks the tenth anniversary of "Great Decisions."

The study is an annual nationwide review, by citizens in their own communities, of the most important decisions we face as a nation and people in the present world situation.

MEETING ONCE a week for eight weeks and using the Fact Sheet Kit, with reading lists and discussion questions, small groups have the opportunity to think through and discuss crucial problems of United States foreign policy.

Topics, and suggested discussion for this year's schedule are:

"World Communism Today—How Great the Danger to the West—Will Atlantic Unity Survive?"; "Egypt and the Middle East—What Prospects for Stability?"; "Disarmament—Alternative to the Balance of Terror?"; "Castro's Cuba—Challenge to the Americans?"; "Indonesia—Guided or Misguided Democracy?";

'World Day Of Prayer' Proclaimed

Mayor William H. Burgum has proclaimed Friday, Feb. 14 as World Day of Prayer in Birmingham.

In his proclamation Mayor Burgum urged all area residents "to dedicate themselves to furthering principles of Christian life throughout their community."

"The purpose of the observance of World Day of Prayer is to unite people of all nations in a common bond of prayer and Christian fellowship and to provide an opportunity to help support mission projects at home and abroad," Burgum said.

The needs of migrant ministry and American Indians and a ministry among students will receive consideration this year in addition to continuing projects of support to foreign women's colleges and provision of Christian literature in other lands.
